EASTERN ASSOCIATION OF MOSQUITO CONTROL WORKERS

Inspection of Mosquito Control Work in Northeastern New Jersey, followed by a meeting of the Association, held a November 6, 1942.

Sixteen members of the Association and 15 guests we present during the inspection, and 16 members and 5 guest attended the meeting. Altogether there were representatives from New York, New Jersey, Delaware, the U. S. Publicalth Service and the U. S. Army.

The group assembled at the Pennsylvania Railroad & tion in Newark, leaving that point at 9:15 A.M. Inspect were made in Essex, Bergen, and Morris Counties, as det ed below. Lunch was at the Elk's Club in Hackensack, and dinner followed by the meeting took place at the Chantic Restaurant in Millburn.

Inspections in Essex County

They were shown the twelve inch pump in operation. This pump drains 286 acres in the Ebling Meadow. The grand looked over work being done by the Bucyrus-Erie excavator this machine has a 3/8 yard orange peel bucket. They is ished the inspection at the new hydraulic fill. This fi was completed on October 15th, 1942.

Inspections in Bergen County

- 1 North Arlington view of Hudson and Bergen Count Meadow (2000 acres) from bluffs along Schyler Avenue. O line of East section of meadow obscured by fog.
- 2 Fast Rutherford. Inspection of recently complete overhaul job of drainage ditch by 1/2 yd. shovel. Length 1500 ft. 16 ft. by 6 ft. outlet into Berry's Creek. Through railroad culvert, flap gates attached to culvert wall act as tidegates.

- 3 Inspection of equipment used in Bergen County inuding new mole attachment for Salt Hay Meadow drainage. Is unit was described by Mr. Sammis of Nassau County, Y. who has operated similar units on Long Island.
- 4 Lunch at Elk's Club, attendance 32. At this int Mr. J. B. Leslie of Bergen and Mr. John Flynn joined party. Press representative of Bergen Evening Record ended luncheon.
- 5 Inspection of ditch improvement. Eckle's Creek, ttle Ferry. Using Bucyrus-Erie 3/8 yd. Dragline ineasing size of ditch from 8 ft. by 4 ft. to 20 ft. by t. Machine working down stream to tidegate at Hacken-k River rather than upstream; Reason saving of approxitely three miles on return trip. Machine will be used reconstruction of dike after reaching tidegate. Disadutage of downstream work. Building up of water head in ont of machine, gathering of debris, floating grass, etc.
- 6 Completed tidegate (4 boxes), Riser Ditch System. te and gates provide drainage for 1500 acres of highland prising drainage area. Due to schedule the East Riser ction of this project (now under construction) was not spected.

Inspections in Morris County

The first stop in Morris County was at Beattie's Dam, this point, a brief explanation was given by James T. Pt. Jr., Ass't. Supt. regarding mosquito breeding in the ea above the dam (some 26 miles) known as the Passaic ley. This area, subject to flood during heavy rainfall, sists of some 18,000 acres. The next stop was at Pine ok where the group was shown the Dragline and the 10" traulic Dredge operated jointly by the Essex and Morris inty Commissions. Here the group was able to view the edge in operation and was able to see the river conditions and the river after dredging. Due to the late hour,

after dredging operations were viewed, the trip to Picatinny Arsenal was cancelled and the group proceeded to Millburn where the meeting of the Association was to be held.

Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by Mr. Robert L. Vannote. (The President, Dr. L. A. Stearns has resigned to take a commission as a hajor in the U. S. Army, and word had been received from First Vice President, Robert Botsford, that he could not be present because of illness.)

Secretary's Report

The secretary's report was presented giving a review of the year's trips and meetings.

Treasurer's Report

The treasurer reported the extension of membership to include workers from California, Illinois and Louisians as well as the original Eastern Seaboard States. During the year 1942 dues have been collected from 32 active and 21 associate members. On the present date, there exists

Publications Committee

Mr. VanDerwerker reported as chairman of the Publications Committee that 3 issues of Mosquito News had been inted and distributed during 1942, and the last issue the year will go to press shortly after November 10. For is a steadily growing demand for the publication, its distribution has accounted for several new applications for membership. Advertising in the book has been id, and while still not entirely self supporting, the its to the Association have been much reduced. The sues have grown larger, and a number of very interesting it in the book have been printed. A number of favorable ments have been received, and the publication seems to it an important place in the mosquito literature.

Meetings and Annual Tour Committee

Mr. Smith reported for the committee. He called

Committee on Circulation of Mosquito News

Dr. Glasgow reported as chairman of this committee. considerable amount of thought and preliminary planning has been engaged in by the committee. Mosquito News is a venture in a field not at present served by any publication. It is receiving wide approval and the interest of mosquito workers throughout the country. It now seems wise to consider future policies, and whether it should be made to appeal generally to mosquito workers, or primarily to the original group. If any changes are to be made, they should be effective by the time the first 1943 issue is printed. The present committee has done an excellent job, but as organized at present, getting out the book imposes an unfail burden on a few men. A number of changes might be made to spread the work, and to provide for continuing editorial policies, to continue the present high standard of the book even though the editorial staff may change. The committee was encouraged to complete its work and to prepare, as soon as practicable, written recommendations in order that the future policy may be considered and definitely decided upon
