## EQUINE ENCEPHALITIS TO RECEIVE SPECIAL ATTENTION AT AMCA CONVENTION

Malaria has been virtually eradicated in the United States, but mosquitoes menace humanity from other fronts. At present, viral encephalitis appears to be the mosquito-borne disease most feared by health agencies and mosquito control workers. A discussion of this disease will therefore be a part of the program of the convention of the American Mosquito Control Association at the Drake Hotel March 5 to 8 inclusive.

Fear of the disease, however, has not been widely felt by the public. The epidemics of viral encephalitis which occurred in St. Louis in 1933 and 1937 aroused panic because the symptoms were similar to those of the African sleeping sickness. The epizootic of sleeping sickness which occurred among horses and mules in Illinois, and at least a dozen states in the Union, was also called by the press "sleeping sickness." It was not until 1938 that an epidemic near Boston, Massachusetts revealed human cases of so-called "sleeping sickness" in an area where equine encephalomyelitis occurred among horses and mules. During this epidemic it was definitely determined that the eastern type of viral encephalitis in humans was the same as that occurring among horses.

In recent investigations by the Hooper Foundation in the states of Washington and California, the virus of encephalitis was found in several species of wild mosquitoes in the area where encephalitis among humans exists.

In the St. Louis epidemic where 1,653 people were afflicted by the so-called "sleeping sickness," the mode of transmission was unknown at the time. Now that the mosquito has been incriminated it is likely that a movement will be started to prevent occurrences similar to those in St. Louis, Boston, Minneapolis, Chicago, Yakima Valley, Washington; County, California; Florida, Texas and Arizona.

It is planned to have several speakers discuss this subject at the convention.
