### BUSINESS MEETING

#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS

2:30 P.M. March 8, 1954

A business meeting of the Board of Directors was held at Haddon Hall Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey, March 8, 1954, at 2:30 P.M.

Those present included: F. C. Bishopp, President; R. E. Dorer, Vice President; T. G. Raley, Executive Secretary; L. W. Smith, Treasurer; C. R. Twinn, Past President.

*Regional Directors:* Donald Mac Creary, Fred Stutz, D. M. Jobbins, C. M. Gjullin, F. C. Wray.

*Committee Members and Visitors:* J. M. Hirst, S. Peters, Richard Peters, W. E. Bickley, Hellen Sollers, Walter D. Henderson, T. D. Mulhern, A. S. West, Don Collins.

The minutes of the previous meeting in Daytona Beach were distributed. Action on their passage was deferred until members could go over them.

President Bishopp appointed the following Resolutions Committee: Jessie Leslie, A. W. Lindquist, K. L. Knight. They were approved.

President submitted his report. Attachment No. 1.

The Nominating Committee submitted its report for the information of the Board. No action was necessary. Attachment No. 2.

The Secretary requested that he be allowed to make his report before the General Session, which was granted.

The Vice President and Recording Secretary made an oral report in which he suggested that some relief be given the Vice President in regard to his duties as Recording Secretary. Mr. Smith stated that this matter had been considered by the Bylaws Committee and that the Committee would make some recommendation concerning it.

Mr. Smith gave a report of the Treasurer's Office. On motion made by Mr. Smith, seconded and unanimously carried, the report was accepted. Attachment No. 3.

Mr. Smith asked if the official title of the Association included the word "Incorporated." It was brought out that the Articles of Incorporation would settle this point, and it was agreed that a search would be made of the records to answer the question.

Secretary Raley read the auditor's report, which was accepted on motion made by Mr. MacCreary, seconded by Mr. Dorer and unanimously carried. Attachment No. 4.

Treasurer Smith submitted a budget, which was fully discussed. On motion made by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Stutz, and unanimously carried, the budget was approved. Attachment No. 5.

There was considerable discussion on procedure to be followed and price to be charged for back issues of MOSQUITO NEWS. Some present wanted to raise the price. Secretary Raley reported that selected distribution of back issues had promoted good will and was responsible for new accounts. President Bishopp suggested that the matter be left up to the Secretary, Treasurer, and Librarian.

Dr. Bickley read a report of the Miscellaneous Publications Committee, which was accepted on motion made by Mr. Raley, seconded by Mr. Stutz, and unanimously carried. Attachment No. 6.

There was considerable discussion on the publication of Bulletin No. 3. Dr. Twinn moved that approval be given for the publication of Bulletin No. 3 in a number comparable with Bulletins No. 1 and 2 under the most favorable circumstances in keeping with previous bulletins. This was seconded by Jobbins and unanimously carried. Mr. Raley moved that the profit from Bulletin No. 2 be turned over

to pay the cost of publishing Bulletin No. 3. This was seconded by Gjullin and duly carried.

Mr. Smith reported on the Committee on Bylaws in which he recommended changing the Bylaws to provide for an additional officer, namely President Elect; changing the life membership from \$150.00 to \$100.00; and making it the duty of the Treasurer rather than the President to have an audit made by a certified public accountant. Mr. Smith moved the adoption of the report and that the provisions of the report be brought before the General Session for a vote. This was seconded by Mr. Dorer and duly carried.

Dr. Bickley read a report of the Advertising Committee, which on motion made by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Jobbins, was duly accepted. President Bishopp suggested that the report be read at the general meeting. Attachment No. 7.

Mr. Raley gave a report of the Membership Committee, and he moved that in addition to the approval of the report, the Board also approve list of new members for membership. This was seconded by Mr. MacCreary, and duly carried. Attachment No. 8.

The President called for a report of the Public Relations Committee, but there was no report.

Dr. West gave an informal report of the Research Committee, stating that he would be prepared to give a more detailed report at a later Board meeting.

Mr. Dorer gave an oral report of the Program Committee, pointing to the printed program as the accomplishment of that Committee.

Reports were called for from the Committee on Awards, Committee on Good Neighbor Club, and the Arrangements Committee, but as members were not present, they were carried over until later.

An oral report on a Committee to arrange for recording proceedings was made by Mr. Jobbins.

President Bishopp brought up the matter of place for the next meeting. No decision was reached at that time.

Mr. Lester Smith made an informal report for Mr. Powers on the Arrangement Committee.

President Bishopp requested Mr. Peters to present the report of the Committee on Publications. No formal action was taken. However, there was considerable discussion in which Mr. Collins made some important comments.

Don Collins submitted a report on notes, contents, and cost of MOSQUITO NEWS. Attachment No. 9.

The meeting was adjourned to meet again at 9:00 A.M. the following day.

#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS

##### SECOND MEETING

9:30 A.M. March 9, 1954

A second meeting of the Board was held at 9:30 A.M. at Haddon Hall Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey, on March 9, 1954.

Those present included: F. C. Bishopp, President; R. E. Dorer, Vice President; T. G. Raley, Executive Secretary; L. W. Smith, Treasurer; C. R. Twinn, Past President.

*Committee Members and Visitors:* A. W. Lindquist, R. L. Vannote, Walter D. Henderson, Dr. Paul R. Meyer, Robert L. Armstrong, Alvin Gelhart, Richard F. Peters, C. Donald Grant, T. D. Mulhern, George E. Powers, Charles T. Foulk, II, A. W. Morrill, A. S. West.

A delegation from Jefferson County, Texas, appeared and requested that consideration be given to holding the next or at least a future meeting in Jefferson County, Texas. Dr. Paul R. Meyer and Alvin Gelhart talked. Mr. Mulhern suggested a summer trip to Texas. The Board withheld action for further consideration.

Mr. Powers gave a report on arrangements, in which he noted a tentative income of \$2,230.00 from registrations and exhibitors with expenses of approximately

\$600.00, leaving a profit of an estimated \$1,600.00.

Mr. Peters gave a report of the Publication Committee. His Committee recommended more articles through the News and Notes section on operational projects. Several spoke in favor of this point. Mr. Collins will promote this through the News. The Committee recommended against changing the cover of MOSQUITO NEWS as had been suggested. A secretary's page for the News was recommended. It was suggested that the editor's page include writings of staff members. On motion made by Mr. Peters, duly seconded, the report was approved.

Mr. Foulk reported that he was not too familiar with the workings of the Good Neighbor Club inasmuch as Mr. Stage had always carried out the details and had left no specific instructions. On motion made by Dr. Twinn, seconded by Mr. Raley, it was voted to conduct another 50-50 Club similar to the one conducted in Florida last year with Mr. Foulk in charge.

On motion made by Dr. Twinn, seconded by Mr. Gjullin, and duly carried, the next meeting place was set for Los Angeles, California. The motion also recommended that the 1956 meeting be held in Jefferson County, Texas, provided suitable arrangements were made.

Mr. Vannote mentioned an invitation to a summer meeting at Toledo which was not acted upon. Dr. Bishopp brought up the matter of a meeting every other year. There was no report from the Committee set up for this purpose.

Mr. Jobbins reported on plans for recording of the proceedings for Dr. Pepper, who was not present.

A report of the Special Committee on Awards was made by A. W. Morrill. Mr. Smith moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Jobbins, and carried. Mr. Morrill then moved that no award be made, which was seconded by Mr. Gjullin and duly carried. Attachment No. 1-A.

Dr. West gave the report of the Committee on Research, in which he recommended a resolution from the Association

against the possible introduction of the mosquito borne virus disease of rabbits, known as myxomatosis. Also recommended for consideration a catalog of membership interests and a cataloging of location of colonies of arthropods of medical importance. Also suggested was a review of progress on the applied side of mosquito control. Dr. Twinn moved that the report be accepted with recommendation that incoming Board supplement suggestions made. This was seconded by Mr. Jobbins and carried.

The Committee on Legislation was not present. Mr. Wray reported a mixup in law in Illinois. No action taken.

Mr. Raley requested authority for exchange account with Public Health Engineer Abstracts, Public Health Service. On motion made by Mr. Stutz, seconded by Mr. Dorer, this was granted.

The matter of honorary membership of Willard King was brought up to get the reaction of the Board. No formal action was taken.

Dr. Brown gave a report from the Special Committee on changing the name of MOSQUITO NEWS, which showed mixed returns. Dr. Brown moved that the question of changing the name of MOSQUITO NEWS to the Journal of the A.M.C.A. be voted on by the entire membership, the question to be constituted under the direction of the President but not to be binding. This was seconded by Mr. Stutz and duly carried.

The meeting adjourned.

FIRST SESSION  
Tuesday, March 9th  
2:00-5:00 P.M.

At the first session of the joint meeting of the New Jersey Mosquito Extermination Association and the American Mosquito Control Association, Charles T. Foulk, II, presiding, introduced Dr. F. C. Bishopp, President of the American Mosquito Control Association. Dr. Bishopp described the Amendment to the Bylaws which had been proposed in the report of the Bylaws Committee and which

had been approved by the Board of Directors. On motion made by Harry R. Singer and seconded by William Thom, a vote of the general membership was called for. This was carried by unanimous vote.

The report of the Nominating Committee was read by Dr. Twinn, which did not include nomination for the new positions provided for in the change in Bylaws which had just been passed. Mr. Vannote nominated Mr. Dick Peters for the position of President Elect and Fred Stutz for Vice President. Dr. Twinn nominated Mr. V. Sam Minnich as Regional Director. Dr. Twinn moved that the nominations be closed, which was seconded by Dr. Bickley and carried.

Dr. Bishopp announced the Resolutions Committee, consisting of Mr. Leslie as Chairman, and Mr. Knight and Mr. Lindquist.

#### FOURTH SESSION Minutes of Meeting

A meeting of the membership of the American Mosquito Control Association was held at Haddon Hall Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey, on March 10th, 1954, at 2:30 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by President Bishopp for the business of electing new officers. Attachment #2.

Dr. C. R. Twinn, Chairman, moved the adoption, seconded by Francis P. Creadon. Motion carried.

There being no other immediate business of the Association, the President adjourned the meeting.

#### SIXTH SESSION Minutes of Meeting

The regular annual business meeting of the American Mosquito Control Association was held at Haddon Hall Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey, on March 11th, 1954, at 4:15 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. F. C. Bishopp, President.

The first order of business was the in-

stallation of the new officers. Robert L. Vannote escorted the new President, R. E. Dorer, and Dr. C. R. Twinn escorted the new Vice President, Fred H. Stutz, to the platform. R. F. Peters, the new President-elect, was absent and was installed in absentia.

Dr. Bishopp turned the gavel over to President Dorer, who addressed the approximately sixty members present. President Dorer then turned the podium over to the Executive Secretary, T. G. Raley, who spoke on several matters pertinent to the welfare of the Association, especially explaining bylaw requirements on nominations and elections.

Secretary Raley reported the receipt of a petition requesting that Dr. W. V. King (retired) be elected to honorary membership. It was moved by Secretary Raley and seconded by C. T. Williamson that Dr. King be elected to honorary membership. Motion carried.

Secretary Raley reported informally on the business of the Association, covering such subjects as publications, the healthy financial condition of the Association, the institution of a budget for the new year, the necessity of increasing the price of single back issues of MOSQUITO NEWS to \$1.75, and that there would be no increase in membership dues.

Thomas D. Mulhern moved that Lester Smith, Treasurer, be complimented for his excellent work as Treasurer. Motion seconded by Dr. W. E. Bickley, and carried.

Mr. Williamson gave report on Bulletin #1 and #2. The supply of Bulletin #1 is about exhausted. He stated that 1,100 copies of Bulletin #2 are still available. Secretary Raley advised the membership that Bulletin #3 is about ready for publication. It will be priced at about \$2.00 per copy.

Dr. Bickley, Advertising Manager of MOSQUITO NEWS, spoke on advertising, thanked those who helped, and reported that the income from advertisements last year produced about \$2,000.00. It was moved by Dr. Bickley, seconded by Secretary Raley, that Robert L. Vannote be

complimented on the fine work he did as Advertising Manager. Motion carried.

Porter B. Brockway, a member of the Legislative Committee, spoke on the Miller Bill. Secretary Raley spoke on Senate Bill #2424, also known as the McCarthy Bill, which pertains to the disposal of surplus government property. J. A. Mulrennan spoke on provisions in the bill and said it was bogged down because too many agencies and organizations are fighting to be included as recipients.

Dr. Bishopp spoke on changes in the organization of the Department of Agriculture.

Secretary Raley spoke on the conservation of water and the tax benefit therefrom.

In speaking of MOSQUITO NEWS, the Executive Secretary stated that approximately 1,172 copies were needed, 712 for membership, 25 for Good Neighbors, 6 Honorary, and about 320 that went to subscribers other than members. He further stated that all but about 73 had paid their dues, which he thought was a good figure.

Dr. L. J. Charles stated that Dr. George Gigliolo had been receiving MOSQUITO NEWS through the Good Neighbor Club, and wanted to thank the Association.

Russell Gies spoke of meeting Dr. L. Vargas in Mexico City and stated that Dr. Vargas has a list of one hundred workers in Mexico who perhaps would be interested in joining the Association. He requested applications be gotten to these men. No action was taken.

President Dorer called for report of the Resolutions Committee. Dr. Kenneth Knight read the resolutions. It was moved by Mr. Vannote, seconded by Dr. A. S. West, that the resolutions be adopted. Motion carried. Attachment #10.

President Dorer reported that in an endeavor to get the true feeling of the membership in the matter of changing the name of MOSQUITO NEWS, the Board of Directors had taken action to poll each member. Dr. Bickley moved to deplore and rescind the action of the Board of Directors in putting to a vote the question

of changing the name of MOSQUITO NEWS, which was seconded by Mr. Mulhern. Dr. Bickley spoke on his motion. Dr. A. W. A. Brown, Helen Sollers, Thomas D. Mulhern, and Harry D. Pratt also spoke on this motion. The motion carried—41 for, 9 against.

President Dorer announced that the next meeting would be held in Los Angeles, California, January 24th to 27th, inclusive, 1955. He also spoke of the strong invitation from members from Jefferson County, Texas, for the 1955 meeting and stated that the Board is considering this invitation for the 1956 meeting. He stated that he hoped a stopover visit to Jefferson County could be made by members enroute to California next January. He also reported an invitation from Cleveland, Ohio, for a 1954 summer meeting.

President Dorer gave credit to the New Jersey Association members for their excellent work on the programs and arrangements for the fine meeting.

Dr. Bishopp thanked one and all, especially Dr. Jobbins for his work on recording the meetings. He stated that some committees did not function too well, and in closing asked that all respond fully when asked to work on committees.

President Dorer asked that Resolution #1 be amended to more fully thank local committees for their work on the recordings and to commend Mr. Reck for his splendid work and also for his work in getting out information. Mr. Vannote made motion to amend resolution, seconded by Dr. West. Carried.

There being no further business to come before the Association, the meeting was adjourned.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Mosquito Control Association was held at Haddon Hall Hotel, Atlantic City, New Jersey, on March 11th, 1954, at 9:30 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by President R. E. Dorer, the following members being present: Richard F. Peters, President-elect; Fred H. Stutz, Vice President; T. G. Raley, Executive Secretary; V. Sam Minnich, Regional Director; Dr. A. W. A. Brown, Regional Director; C. M. Gjullin, Regional Director; Dr. D. M. Jobbins, Regional Director; Dr. F. C. Bishopp, Immediate Past President; Dr. C. R. Twinn, Past President.

President Dorer discussed his plans for mapping out duties of each constituted committee.

Dr. Bishopp moved approval of the minutes of the previous annual meeting, as presented and distributed to the membership in mimeographed form at the beginning of the general meeting. Mr. Minnich seconded. Motion carried.

Dr. Twinn moved that the following be elected to the Nominating Committee for the coming year:

Dr. F. C. Bishopp, Chairman, Southwest (Gulf) Region; George Powers, Northeast Region; Helen Louise Trembley, Central-East Region; Dr. W. C. McDuffie, Southeast Region; Franklin C. Wray, North-Central Region; Leslie D. Beadle, Rocky Mountain Region; Gaines W. Eddy, Pacific Northwest Region; Harold F. Gray, Pacific Southwest Region; Dr. H. P. S. Gillette, Mexico, Central and South America, West Indies Regions; Dr. B. Hocking, Canada.

Motion seconded by Mr. Gjullin. Carried.

Mr. Raley moved that the following be elected to the Finance Committee: Lester Smith, Chairman; Dr. Don M. Rees, V. Sam Minnich, Dr. C. R. Twinn.

Motion seconded by Dr. Bishopp, and carried.

It was moved by Mr. Peters that the following be appointed to the Good Neighbors Club Committee: Charles T. Foulk, Chairman; Helen Louise Trembley, Harry H. Stage, Helen Sollers, Dr. D. M. Jobbins.

Motion seconded by Dr. Brown. Carried.

Dr. Bishopp moved that the appoint-

ment of Robert L. Vannote as National Advisor be approved. Seconded by Dr. Brown, and carried.

It was moved by Dr. Twinn and seconded by Mr. Peters that Dr. D. L. Collins be reappointed Editor of MOSQUITO NEWS; further, that he be highly complimented by the President for his excellent work on MOSQUITO NEWS; further, that his capable assistant be advised of our appreciation of her work; and further, that a letter be sent to Dr. Collins' superior advising him of the fine and valuable work done by Dr. Collins for the Association in editing MOSQUITO NEWS. Motion carried.

Mr. Raley opened a discussion on the matter of the Association defraying a part of the expenses of officers and others in attending annual meetings of the Association when the meetings are held across the country from the places of employment of the officers. Dr. Twinn moved that this matter be referred to the Finance Committee. Motion seconded by Mr. Peters, and carried.

A discussion was held relative to the distribution of the reports of the proceedings of the joint meetings. Some members felt that since those in attendance had paid for their copies through the payment of the \$4.00 registration fee, those not in attendance should be charged for copies. Dr. Jobbins brought out the fact that there were several cost items that could not be determined until later, and that these items were very pertinent to any decision made at this time. A tentative program of arrangements covering this matter was sent to the members of the Board of Directors after a meeting in September 1953 between representatives of both associations. The membership of the Board agreed to the arrangement. It was moved by Dr. Twinn that the matter of the distribution of the reports of the proceedings of the joint meetings be referred to the Finance Committee for recommendations to the Board of Directors. Seconded by Dr. Jobbins. Motion did not carry. Dr. Brown moved that the original decision, reached by a mail vote, be adhered to and that each member receive a copy of the

report of the joint proceedings. Motion seconded by Dr. Bishopp, and carried.

Dr. Brown moved adjournment. Mr. Gjullin seconded. Motion carried.

### ATTACHMENT #1

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE  
AMERICAN MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION  
Atlantic City  
March 8th, 1954

It seems appropriate for me to present a brief review of association activities, particularly those with which I have been directly concerned.

I'm sure you have pleasant memories of the splendid meeting of the American Association in Daytona Beach, April 12-17, when Dr. Twinn completed his highly successful term as president and the Association honored me with that office and elected Rowland Dorer as our working vice-president. Rowland has done a top job during the year as he did as treasurer of the Association. His work during the year culminated in arranging, in cooperation with Bailey Pepper, the excellent program for the present meeting. At the Florida meeting Ted Raley got under full steam as executive-secretary of the Association and has been going forward with open throttle throughout the year.

Soon after the Daytona Beach meeting, committees were set up under several chairmen designated and approved at that meeting. These committees have worked well for the most part and I trust that we will have their several reports presented at this session.

It will be recalled that an enthusiastic group from Galveston, Texas, attended the Daytona Beach meeting and made an urgent plea for the Association to meet in Galveston in the near future. Arrangements to hold the 1954 meeting here in Atlantic City in conjunction with the New Jersey Mosquito Extermination Association had progressed so far that a change of that meeting was hardly possible, but consideration was given to the possibility of holding the 1955 meeting there. It was promised, however, that an effort would

be made to arrange a summer meeting in Galveston or at least to have members of the Association visit Galveston and attempt to aid the Texas Gulf Counties in organizing for mosquito control.

I had considerable correspondence with those interested in promoting mosquito control in Texas and on July 29 took part in a meeting in the Buccaneer Hotel in Galveston, attended by county and city officials, citizens of Galveston County and representatives of some of the adjacent counties. A free discussion took place of mosquito problems and needs as well as difficulties in financing antimosquito work. A Galveston County Mosquito Control Association was then organized and Dr. Carl Nau was elected president.

Following the meeting Mr. Cox, who has been supervising mosquito work on Galveston Island, toured the area to give me an idea of the several mosquito problems existing there. On September 17 I made a short visit to the area and discussed plans to get further organizational work underway.

During the winter following the filing of a petition, an election was held in accordance with the state law to establish a mosquito control district in Galveston County. This was carried by a comfortable margin, but still the problem of financing the project was not solved.

President Nau, in recent correspondence, has suggested the desirability of a field meeting in April. I have encouraged this plan and Lester Smith has indicated that he, Bob Vannote and Vernon Conant might be able to attend if it does not conflict with the Florida Association Meeting to be held in April.

Harry Stage represented the AMCA at the Fifth International Congresses of Tropical Medicine and Malaria which was held in Istanbul, Turkey, August 28 to September 4. He was also an official U. S. delegate representing the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Stage resigned from the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine in October 1953 to take a position in Indo China with the F.O.A. and arranged for

Bill Bickley to take over as advertising manager of Mosquito News. This caused the job of Associate Editor of the News and Notes to be shifted. Austin Morrill agreed to undertake that work.

The untimely death of Lyell Clarke left the directorship in the North Central Region vacant. An interim appointment of F. C. Wray was made to this position.

A. W. Lindquist was brought to Washington about July 1 to fill the position of Chief of the Division of Insects Affecting Man and Animals made vacant by the elevation of E. F. Knipping to Assistant Chief of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. This position in turn was vacated by my resignation to assume a position with the Oscar Johnston Cotton Foundation.

C. M. Gjullin was appointed Regional Director of the Pacific Northwest area when Dr. Lindquist moved East.

During the year I have traveled over much of the United States and have attempted to promote the interests of the Association whenever opportunity offered. I attended the meetings of the Western Branch of the Entomological Society of America at Lake Tahoe, California, June 22-25, the Cotton States Branch in Biloxi, Miss., January 25-27, the Southwestern Branch in Dallas, Texas, Feb. 1-3, and the annual meeting of the parent Association in Los Angeles, Calif., December 7-10.

Unfortunately I was unable to attend the meeting of the Utah Mosquito Abatement Association or that of the Virginia Mosquito Control Association but I did attend the 22nd annual meeting of the California Mosquito Control Association in Berkeley, Calif., December 1-3. This was an excellent meeting with a well rounded program.

Opportunity was taken by officers of the Association present to discuss some of the work of the organization and plans for the meeting here in Atlantic City.

One of my regrets is that the publication of Bulletin No. 3 of the AMCA has not been realized during the year. A number of problems have been encountered in connection with this project. Miss

Trembley has worked hard under several handicaps to put the manuscript into final form and the prospects for getting this useful publication out this year are good.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE SPECIAL  
COMMITTEE ON AWARDS

Mr. President and members of the Association:

Having in mind the need of this Association for even closer unity among the membership rather than distinctions which might be both invidious and divisive, and after careful consideration also of the difficulties which would attend the selection, in an Association of this sort, of one person whose work might be acclaimed the most outstanding, the Committee recommends that no such award, annual or otherwise, be made at this time.

In lieu of making such an award, it is recommended that it be stated by the President to be the duty of each of the Regional Directors to send in, each year, for publication in the Association's journal, Mosquito News, a short narrative description of a piece of work done by a member from his region which the Director adjudges to be both creative and of general interest as making a significant advance in a technique of the study and control of mosquitoes.

Should it nevertheless be the decision of the President and the Membership that an award be made at this time, it is recommended:

That the President choose five members to constitute a Committee on Awards,

That these members be chosen to represent ecology, taxonomy, morphology, toxicology and applied control,

That two of the five be appointed for two years, two for three and one for four, in order that continuity may be assured, and

That the Committee be instructed to choose a person from among the membership who shall be given an award and



designated as *one* of the Association's outstanding members, the award being based, not upon any one portion or chronological period of his work, but upon his whole contribution to his field of mosquito control.

Cash on deposit, at January 31, 1954, was reconciled with the statement supplied by the bank, and was confirmed to us by letter from the institution.

#### Membership Committee Report 1953

T. G. Raley, Chairman

Membership in the American Mosquito Control Association during 1953 was probably not the highest on record but, it came so very close each member can be proud of the Association progress. A bill from Boyd's Printing Company for the June issue of 1952 shows that Mosquito News was mailed to 1,089 addresses. The bill for December 1953 lists 1038 addresses. At first glance this would indicate a decline in interest but when the drastic readjustments made by Mr. Dorer in 1952 are taken into consideration the recovery has been remarkable. Several of the 1038 addresses receive more than one copy so actually this is not a complete figure. A rough count of these multiple mailings will add about 45 to the number receiving Mosquito News.

Probably the most encouraging note in this readjustment period has little to do with figures as such. Whether the Association has 900, 1100 or even 1500 members means little unless each has an active interest in the affairs of the group. During the year and a half that I have been involved with the membership list

I have been impressed with the healthy growth that has occurred. At least half of the new accounts have been stimulated by the quality of Mosquito News and were completely voluntary. Most of the others were sponsored by members who are not on the Membership Committee. (As Chairman I will claim a few for the Committee but really don't mind being last.) To the best of my knowledge all of the sponsored members joined at their request, too. They will all be members for many years to come.

Classes of membership and subscribers now receiving Mosquito News are rather hard to break down into figures now that the one price is paid by all. From records available in the Executive Secretary's office the following is a reasonable indication:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the American Mosquito Control Association go on record as being in full support of the intent of this resolution and that the executive Secretary of the Association be instructed to inform the American Association for the Advancement of Science of its action through an official letter.

To be elected (one year term of office).

#### ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

##### *Section 2.*

B. Life membership to be reduced from \$150.00 to \$100.00, payment to be made in lump sum.

#### ARTICLE VI. POWERS AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

##### *Section 1. President.*

F. To engage a Certified Public Accountant to audit the books annually. (To be changed to the duty of the Treasurer.)

G. To submit the accountant's report to the Board of Directors. (To be changed to the duty of the Treasurer.)

H. To suggest for consideration by the Board of Directors, names for the Chairman and members for the standing committees and such special committees as are provided for in the Bylaws or may be approved by the Board. (To be changed to the duty of the President-elect.)

The following suggestions for changes in our Bylaws have some from members of the Association and officers concerned (namely, your Secretary and Treasurer).

We believe the suggested changes will divide more of the work among the elected officers and not overload any particular office. Any suggestions or changes will be appreciated by me.
