### MINUTES, BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, AMERICAN MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION

March 11, 1963

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Mosquito Control Association was held in the Sun Room of the Hotel Haddon Hall, Atlantic City, at 9:00 a.m., on March 11, 1963, with President Arthur Geib presiding. Members of the Board present were: Don Micks, John Mulrennan, W. E. Bickley, A. W. A. Brown, Vernon Conant, Helen Sollers-Riedel, G. T. Carmichael, G. C. Collett, Charles Scheel, Osmond Breland, R. F. Harwood, Howard Greenfield, R. E. Dorer, T. G. Raley, L. W. Smith. Also present were: Don Collins, Robert A. Hedeon, Albert W. Buzicky, Robert Ostergard, Richard Peters, Wayne Miller, Don Murray, Daniel Jobbins, Ed Davis, T. D. Mulhern, J. Graham, Les Brumbaugh, F. C. Bishopp, Fred Stutz, and J. G. Foyle.

President Geib, in the absence of the Recording Secretary, asked that one be appointed. R. E. Dorer was selected to serve. He called the roll and found all but two members of the official family present.

President Geib asked if there were any corrections to the minutes of the last meeting of the Board as published in *Mosquito News*. There being none, he directed the minutes be approved as published. He then read his Annual Report (see Attachment #1). It was moved by Carmichael that the report be accepted; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

A report of the Nominating Committee was made by Bickley (see Attachment #2). Raley reported the results of the election, which were as follows:

President elect, John A. Mulrennan...398  
Vice President, A. W. A. Brown...393  
Treasurer, Lester Smith.....387

It was moved by Breland that only the

names of those elected be published; seconded by Bickley; carried.

Lester Smith, in giving the Treasurer's Report noted that all Board Members had been mailed a copy of the Auditor's Report (see Attachment #3). The Treasurer's Report was accepted in motion made by Mulrennan; seconded by Micks; carried.

A report of the Finance and Policy Committee was made by Scheel (see Attachment #4). Raley, commenting on the report, stated that there had been some cancellations due to the raise in dues; however, it was too early to appraise the full effect. Micks commented that other sources of revenue should be considered. On motion made by Collett, the report was accepted; seconded by Brown; carried.

Scheel then presented the 1963 budget, which was reviewed point by point and showed the excellent financial status of the Association. Some minor corrections were made. Mulrennan moved that the budget be accepted as corrected; seconded by Micks; carried (see Attachment #4-A).

In connection with a \$400 item in the budget for staff expenses for the Editor of *Mosquito News*, Brown moved that in view of the great appreciation of the Board in behalf of the Association for the tremendous work being done by the editor and his staff, the Board views with pleasure the inclusion of this item as a token of their appreciation; seconded by Raley and unanimously passed.

A report of the Advertising Committee was read by President Geib (see Attachment #5). Motion to accept report made by Micks; seconded by Carmichael; carried.

A report of the Editor of *Mosquito News* was made by Collins (see Attachment #6). In the discussion which followed the report, the current charges to authors were brought up. Bickley moved to reappraise the charges and bring them up to date based on actual costs; seconded by Collett; carried. On motion made by Mulrennan, seconded by Brown, and duly carried, the Editor's report was accepted. Brown moved that Collins be instructed to check the cost of spine binding for *Mosquito News* and report back at next meeting of the Board; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

President Geib read a letter from the Chairman of the Committee on Publications, stating that his committee had nothing to report. Moved acceptance by Bickley; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

At this point, President Geib suggested the publication of the bylaws of the Association in *Mosquito News*. Raley reported that there were some very minor words and phrases in the bylaws which should be corrected before they were published. Micks moved that the President endeavor to have the Bylaws Committee make the changes so that action can be taken at the business meeting of the Association; seconded by Mulrennan; carried.

An oral report of Associate Editor Sollers-Riedel was given. She reported that during the year some more foreign exchanges had been picked up. She appealed for reprints and reports, stating that they are of most benefit if material is recent. Carmichael moved the adoption of the report; seconded by Bickley; carried.

President Geib suggested that the regional directors should be given the responsibility for securing operational papers for publication in *Mosquito News* and that they also be more active on membership matters and in securing advertisements for *Mosquito News*. Micks reported that these matters were being given serious attention and a definite plan of action would be forthcoming.

The Membership Committee's report was given by Buzicky (see Attachment #7), which showed a net gain over the 1,654 members as of December, 1961, of 68. The report was accepted by motion made by Carmichael; seconded by Mulrennan; carried.

A report of the National Adviser was given by Dorer (see Attachment #8). Bickley moved its acceptance; seconded by Mulrennan; carried.

Mulrennan gave an oral report of the Program Committee and gave thanks to all who had worked so hard in arranging it. He particularly thanked Dr. Pepper, Les Smith, and Dr. Bishopp. Raley moved the report be accepted; seconded by Scheel; carried.

Lester Smith gave a report of the Arrangements Committee, mentioning features as printed in the program. Report accepted on motion by Carmichael; seconded by Harwood; carried.

President Geib read a report of the Bylaws Committee in which it was reported that "due to the outstanding work done by the previous Bylaws Committee, there have not been any suggested changes proposed to us or by us." Accepted on motion by Micks; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

Hedeen reported on progress which had been made in the revision of Bulletin #1 on airplane spraying (see Attachment #9). He reported on the new F.A.A. regulations. Report was accepted on motion by Breland; seconded by Carmichael; carried.

Micks moved that this committee be instructed to prepare a proper resolution for the revision of F.A.A. regulations for submission at the business session of the Association; seconded by Breland; carried.

Miller gave a report of the Legislative Committee (see Attachment #10), in which he reported H.R. 2486 bill "Mosquito Control Act of 1963" had been introduced in Congress by Thomas Downing. Report accepted on motion by Bickley; seconded by Collett; carried.

The Board discussed the possibility of

amending the surplus property act so as to allow mosquito control participation. Mulrennan moved that the Legislative Committee prepare a suitable resolution to be submitted to the membership at the business session. Seconded by Greenfield; carried.

A report of the Public Relations Committee was given by Miller, Acting Chairman (see Attachment #11), who reported the tragic death of Chairman William W. Warner. Motion for adoption made by Mulrennan; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

President Geib reported that he had sent flowers in the name of the Association in remembrance of Bill Warner. On motion made by Carmichael, seconded by Breland, and carried, the bill was ordered paid by the Association.

Brown reported that the Research and Development Committee was working on a report on alternative insecticides which is a two-year study and that a full report will be made next year. Accepted on motion by Carmichael; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

Davis gave a report on the Good Neighbor Club (see Attachment #12). Motion it be accepted by Mulrennan; seconded by Brown; carried.

Bickley reported on affiliation with the American Institute of Biological Societies

and moved that any action be postponed; seconded by Sollers-Riedel; carried.

Bickley gave a report of Committee on Delegates to Congress of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (see Attachment #13). Motion for approval made by Sollers-Riedel; seconded by Mulrennan; carried.

On motion made by Bickley, seconded by Mulrennan, carried, all new members applying between the period December 5, 1961, and March 11, 1963, were approved.

Raley reported on the results of the regional elections of Directors which were as follows:

President Geib reported that the 1964 Annual Meeting of the Association would be held at the Pick-Congress Hotel in Chicago, March 1-4. The 1965 meeting would be held in Tampa, Florida, and the 1966 meeting would be held in Savannah, Georgia.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

## MINUTES, BUSINESS MEETING, AMERICAN MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION March 13, 1963

A business meeting of the American Mosquito Control Association was held in the Garden Room of Hotel Haddon Hall in Atlantic City, New Jersey, at 3:30 p.m., on March 13, 1963, with approximately 100 attending.

President Arthur Geib read a report of the activities of the Association during the past year (see Attachment #1).

Treasurer Lester Smith gave the highlights of the Treasurer's report and re-

ferred the membership to the detailed report to be published in *Mosquito News* (see Attachment #3).

Francis Creadon gave a report of the activities of the Advertising Committee (details included in report presented at the Board Meeting) (see Attachment #5). Mr. Creadon reported that a new rate for advertising was being put into effect. The professional card at \$6.00 was being replaced with a 1/4-page ad at

\$18.00. He encouraged all mosquito associations and districts to advertise in *Mosquito News*.

Editor Don Collins gave an oral report on publication of *Mosquito News*, which was a digest of a full report given at the Board Meeting (see Attachment #6).

A. W. Buzicky, Chairman of the Membership Committee, gave a report of that committee, bringing out the points that as of December, 1961, there were 1,654 on the mailing list for *Mosquito News*. During 1962, through resignation or cancellation, 145 were dropped; however, 213 new accounts were received, showing a net gain of 68 members (see Attachment #7).

The National Advisor, R. E. Dorer, gave a brief report of his activities, which included only a portion of the year (see Attachment #8).

A report of the Program Committee was made by John Mulrennan, who gave much credit to Dr. Bailey Pepper and his associates in New Jersey for the preparation and execution of the joint meeting.

Mr. Sam Ricks, Public Relations Director, Rutgers University, gave a commentary on how publicity was carried on for the joint meeting, which gave an insight into the tremendous amount of work involved.

A report of the Good Neighbor Committee was given by Ed Davis. This also was a digest of the full report given to the Board (see Attachment #12).

The following five resolutions were read by the Resolutions Committee Chairman, R. E. Dorer, who moved their adoption. The motion was seconded by Carmichael and unanimously adopted:

#### RESOLUTION NO. 1

WHEREAS, since our last meeting several members through the infinite wisdom of God have been taken from our midst,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Assembly stand for one minute of silence in respect for our departed co-workers and friends.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2

WHEREAS, the administration and operation of the American Mosquito Control Association is carried on by the voluntary work of many individuals, and

WHEREAS, the volume of work done by some members is tremendous,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Assembly take this opportunity to express its appreciation for all of the contributions in the form of service performed by these devoted members.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 3

WHEREAS, Mr. Robert L. Vannote found it necessary because of ill health to resign as National Advisor,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Association takes this opportunity to thank him for his many years of service and to wish him a quick recovery to good health.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS, this joint meeting marks the Fiftieth Anniversary of the New Jersey Mosquito Extermination Association,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the American Mosquito Control Association takes this opportunity to honor that Association for its many contributions to the knowledge of mosquitoes and their control and to the leadership it has furnished for these many years.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 5

WHEREAS, this joint meeting of the American Mosquito Control Association and the New Jersey Mosquito Extermination Association held in Atlantic City has proceeded with dispatch indicating much planning and preparation, and

WHEREAS, the arrangements have been excellent, the program stimulating, the exhibits outstanding, and the special events very enjoyable,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that

we herewith offer expression of our appreciation and gratitude to the Arrangement, Program, and other Special Committees of both Associations, to the commercial exhibitors, the hotel management, and to all others who had a part in making this meeting a memorable occasion.

The following resolution was read and moved for adoption by Dorer, seconded by Bishopp, and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Federal surplus property is not available to State and Territorial Health Centers under the Federal Surplus Act and

WHEREAS, vast amounts of this equipment could be economically utilized in public health research and other public health measures accruing to the citizens of the States and Territories,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the American Mosquito Control Association meeting in executive session on March 13, 1963 in Atlantic City, New Jersey, does hereby delegate authority to its Legislative Committee to draft a proper bill amending the Federal Surplus Property Law making it possible for State and Territorial Health Centers to receive such property, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that when said bill has been introduced in both houses of the Congress, that the President of the Association be instructed to write a letter to members of the Health, Education and Welfare Committee requesting their support in the passage of the bill and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all State Mosquito Control Associations, State Public Health Associations and all local mosquito control districts and State and Territorial Health Departments be requested to place their support back of this bill.

The following resolution was read and moved for adoption by Dorer, seconded by Rees, and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS the proposed new part 55 of the Civil Air Regulations "Agricultural Aircraft Operations" contains certain provisions that would make the utilization of aircraft by governmental agencies

in the control of mosquitoes and other arthropods of public health importance practically impossible;

AND, WHEREAS the Federal Aviation Agency has requested that comments on the proposed regulations be forwarded to that agency by 1 April 1963;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the American Mosquito Control Association at its annual meeting during the period of 12-15 March in Atlantic City, New Jersey, goes on record as recommending that all governmental organizations utilizing aircraft for the control of mosquitoes and other arthropods of public health importance be specifically excluded from the provisions of the proposed regulations, and that the Executive Secretary of the Association be instructed to forward this resolution to the Federal Aviation Agency by 1 April 1963.

Secretary Ted Raley gave a brief report of the activities of his office. He stressed the need for notifying him of address changes. He also announced the election of regional directors as noted above.

Dr. Fred Bishopp moved that all action taken by the Board of Directors for 1962 be approved. This was seconded by Harry Stage and unanimously adopted.

President Geib announced the results of the election and asked that Don Micks come forward and be presented with the gavel.

President Micks asked that Past President Peters escort President-elect John Mulrennan to the rostrum and then requested Past President Dorer to escort Dr. A. W. A. Brown, Vice President, forward.

President Micks praised the immediate Past President and announced that Lester Smith had been re-elected as Treasurer.

At this point, the meeting was adjourned with all in good spirits.

MINUTES, BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, AMERICAN  
MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION  
March 14, 1963

The first meeting of the 1963 Board of Directors was held in the Sun Room of Hotel Haddon Hall, Atlantic City, at 4:30 p.m., on March 14, 1963, with President Don Micks presiding.

Those present included: William E. Bickley, T. D. Mulhern, Helen Sollers-Riedel, John Mulrennan, A. W. Buzicky, D. L. Collins, J. G. Foyle, Glen C. Collett, George T. Carmichael, A. W. A. Brown, Ted Raley, Lester Smith, Robert L. Vannote (proxy for Art Geib), Don Murray, Christian A. Vieser, Gardner McFarland, Alex Moore, and R. E. Dorer.

On motion made by Mulhern, seconded by Mrs. Sollers-Riedel, and unanimously passed, Ted Raley was appointed as Executive Secretary for the coming year.

On motion made by Bickley, seconded by Carmichael and duly passed, a contract between the Executive Secretary and the Association for contractual service was renewed.

There was considerable discussion on the duties and need for the position of National Advisor. On motion made by Mulrennan, seconded by Mulhern, and duly carried, the position of National Advisor was dropped.

On motion made by Mulrennan, seconded by Bickley, and unanimously carried, R. E. Dorer was appointed as a representative of the Association on the National Mosquito Control—Fish and Wildlife Management Coordination Committee.

President Micks presented a proposed list of committee appointments for 1963. After some minor corrections, Carmichael moved these approved, which was seconded by Collett and passed (see Attachment 14).

On motion made by Mulhern, seconded by Brown, and carried, the following travel allowances to the 1964 annual meeting were voted:

Advertising Manager .....	50.00
Editor <i>Mosquito News</i> .....	125.00
Treasurer .....	125.00

It was moved by Mulrennan, seconded by Mulhern, and duly passed, that Harry T. Smith be reappointed Assistant Treasurer.

Ted Raley reported that the New Jersey Mosquito Extermination Association had agreed to publish all of the papers presented at the joint 1963 meeting in their proceedings, and that the minutes of the American Mosquito Control Association meetings would be published in *Mosquito News*. On motion made by Brown, seconded by Mulrennan, and carried, the Executive Secretary was instructed to notify the New Jersey Association that the above arrangements were satisfactory.

Lester Smith tentatively reported to the Board that 611 had registered and that 320 attended the banquet. He stated that a full report would be forthcoming at a later date.

Mr. Carmichael moved that the President send a letter to the Associate Commissioner of the N. Y. State Education Dept., expressing the thanks of the Association for cooperation in the work of Editor Don Collins and his staff on *Mosquito News*. This was seconded by Brown and unanimously carried.

President Micks reported that arrangements had been made for the 1964 annual meeting at the Pick-Congress Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, March 1-4. He also reported that Tampa, Florida, had been selected for the 1965 meeting, and Savannah, Georgia, for the 1966 meeting. Dr. Brown reported on his plans for a program at the Chicago meeting. On motion made by Bickley, the invitations to meet in Chicago in 1964, Tampa in 1965, and Savannah in 1966 were accepted. This was seconded by Mulrennan, and carried.

Mr. Smith expressed the need for the various associations to schedule their meetings with more forethought so as to eliminate duplication of meeting dates. This, he thought, would enable more people to attend. Ted Raley volunteered to advertise the dates of the meetings, hoping that this might help to reduce conflicting dates.

Secretary Raley suggested that the Regional Directors be assigned specific duties which they would be expected to perform for the good of the Association and that they be given a quota, for certain assignments.

President Micks reported that Bulletin #3 was about out of print and that there was a need to have it rewritten, and that

Helen Louise Durkee had expressed an interest in such a project. It was moved by Brown that President Micks be directed to act as he sees fit in this matter; seconded by Bickley; and passed. Mrs. Sollers-Riedel suggested that it might be better to make a new bulletin #5 rather than publish it as a revision of Bulletin #3.

Bickley moved that the Editor be instructed to charge at least \$15.00 a page for printing of manuscripts in excess of six pages; seconded by Brown; carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 6:00 p.m.

ATTACHMENT #1  
REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT  
March 11, 1963

In many ways this has been a quiet and routine year in the affairs of the American Mosquito Control Association. In other ways, it has been a most eventful year, as a result of the action taken at the last meeting to increase the cost of annual membership from \$5.00 to \$8.00, effective January 1, 1963. The consequence of this action cannot yet be determined and probably will not be clearly defined until another year has passed. The most accurate way to determine membership from year to year is to utilize the December mailing list of *Mosquito News*. This record shows a total of 1,654 members for the year 1961, compared to 1,722 members for December 1962, or a gain of 68 members for this past year. This is an encouraging gain and a sign of continued growth, the consequence of the efforts of many members and, most particularly, the hard work of Al Buzicky and his Membership Committee of the past two years.

These results might tend to make one relax and believe the transition is taking place with little or no problem. This, however, is not the case. As had been anticipated, numerous drop-outs have begun to show since the first of the year, and

only time will tell how many members will be lost because of the increase in dues. Many of these, of course, will be members with only nominal interests in the Association and its affairs, feeling that their membership benefits are not worth the increase.

I cannot believe the number of those dropping out will be of sufficient magnitude seriously to affect the Association, yet it now appears the numbers will be significant. Confronted with this situation, it is obviously all the more essential that we all make a real effort to bring in just one new member apiece. Such an accomplishment would develop a wonderful foundation on which to build a strong Association, capable of carrying its own weight, while providing the maximum benefits to all interested and engaged in mosquito control.

Looking back, I should like to compare briefly our present status with that of a few years ago. Many will recall the year of 1952, when at the time of the Annual Meeting, outstanding bills could not be paid and the bank account was bare. Today, we have a \$6,000 savings fund and a conservative estimate of anticipated reve-

nues versus expenditures should keep us in the black. This amount, however, in my opinion, is not sufficient to permit us to embark in the immediate future on our goal of a full-time Secretary and payment of reasonable amounts for other services, such as editorial, etc. Instead, we need to wait this year to determine the consequence of our change in rates. I believe that when this is behind us, when we have rebuilt to a membership of 2,000 or more, and when we have accumulated approximately \$20,000, we will be in a position to venture forth and build a stronger Association by paying for some of the services which have been donated for so long a time by so many members.

I should like to report that during the year, I regretfully accepted the resignation of our long-time National Advisor, Bob Vannotte. On behalf of the membership, I wish to express our appreciation for the time and services he so ably carried on, to the benefit of the Association. We are going to miss Bob very much, but I am happy to report that Rollie Dorer accepted appointment to this office and has been serving in this capacity for the past several months.

The National Mosquito Control and Fish and Wildlife Coordinating Committee sponsored a seminar held at Yosemite National Park, California, October 15 to 18, 1962. This proved to be an outstanding meeting, for which I wish to commend Oscar Lopp, Ken Quarterman and many others for a job well done. If you have not yet purchased a copy of the proceedings of these meetings, I suggest that you do so at the earliest opportunity. You will find much information of interest and value contained therein.

I should also like to call attention to and commend Don Collins for the excellent editorial he prepared and published in the December 1962 issue of *Mosquito News*. His analysis of Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring" and reply thereto is most meaningful and concise. I am sure we will all refer to this in answering problems concerned with toxicants. Don't overlook this editorial.

I wish to thank all the officers, committees, and members for their help in carrying out the duties and Association affairs during the year 1962.

## ATTACHMENT #4

## REPORT OF FINANCE AND POLICY COUNCIL

March 12-15, 1963

Despite a small imbalance in our 1962 budget performance, the fiscal status of the Association for all practical purposes may be considered to be in a reasonably sound condition. The potentialities for improvement lend considerable encouragement to a view of optimism both for additional income and broadening of Association values.

It should be pointed out, however, that a review of our approach in the matter of seeking and retaining sources of revenue seems to be very much in order if we hope to attain these desired levels of improvement in any appreciable degree. For instance, our expectations in returns for acquiring a substantial increase in membership accounts has not been realized. During 1962 while we gained 213 new memberships we also lost by cancellation 145 for a net increase of 68. However, 69 accounts remained unpaid at the end of 1962, which may be considered as possible cancellations. If this becomes a reality we will be starting the new year with a net loss of one member.

Our advertising effort also failed to be as productive as anticipated. Compared with 20 advertisers in the December 1961 issue of the *News*, the December 1962 issue shows a loss of four old and a gain of five new advertisers for a net increase of one. Of the total 21 advertisers in this issue, six are carried by various state control organizations and only one by a control district. Admittedly, this is not a very encouraging picture and not too much to be proud of.

The matter of increasing certain of our rates should have had only a minimal effect upon the membership status since, as has been previously emphasized, few other organizations in the mosquito control field have as much to offer for the same fee as has the AMCA.

We are apparently failing to sell the more salient points of the Association

values forcefully enough in our contacts or are possessed of some internal shortcomings in service or policy not too generally acceptable to the average prospect. There is undoubtedly something wrong here that we should know about and make every effort to correct. Could it be that we are unwittingly failing to show the progress in dealing with certain measures and issues which are basically essential to maintain a continued interest of our membership, encourage new applicants and develop local and international prestige?

Criticism has been made from time to time by some of our field control people of the limited amount of time and space devoted to material of specific interest to them in both the *NEWS* and at the general annual meetings. Since the District Trustees are not always assured that their field men would have something practical to gain in attending such meetings, there has been a reluctance to send such representatives to the annual sessions. The same attitude has been expressed in maintaining memberships for their people in the Association because of the limited amount of operating interest displayed in the *News*. After all, the field of memberships and advertising is currently our best source of income. It should be prudently and yet most vigorously exploited by the most capable minds we are able to muster. It would seem that the character of material sponsored by the Association in all of its activities should be at such a balanced level as to be in demand by all concerned in the general field of mosquito control rather than requiring constant solicitation for its support from Association personnel.

While the business of providing and maintaining the interest stimulus for our present members and prospective additions is perhaps the most important single function of the Association's management, much attention must also of necessity be constantly focused upon the promotion of

Association values pointing toward any possible new horizons of enlightenment or usefulness in the general area of mosquito control. Any appreciable realization or accomplishment of such ambitions naturally requires a fiscal mechanism and staff organization with a much broader base than we are presently employing. This fact has been recognized for a number of years and steps have been underway toward establishing a full-time Managing Secretary to absorb the ever-increasing load of detail and responsibility of our present Executive Secretary who has been graciously carrying most of this work gratuitously.

The year 1962 represents the first period during which certain functions of the Treasurer's office have been absorbed by the Executive Secretary as a move toward complete consolidation of the clerical details in both offices. The effectiveness and economy of this initial step are still being evolved but there has been general agreement that this action was highly desirable and that it will prove profitable in due course.

However, in order to properly round out the program of an orderly and progressive approach toward providing a full-time Manager, our source and amount of revenue must be implemented substantially. Basically, a revitalized effort toward retaining members on our roll should be established in support of whatever success is achieved in procuring new recruits. The move toward increasing dues will in time

no doubt prove profitable, especially when the drive for new members attracts the sound, substantial type of individual who will be materially impressed by what we have to offer.

The advertising possibilities seemingly still have much to offer, especially among such suppliers who do not now advertise in the *News*. If their products are successfully filling the needs of some of our members, it should not be too difficult for such members to convince their supplier of the potentialities of a broader application of their product through an ad in the *News*.

There are, of course, a number of other possibilities for additional revenue that could be suggested as a means of providing stable sources of income for supporting our future, but before much more can be hoped for from any source it would appear highly desirable to take a good look at whatever substance there may be to the criticism and objections mentioned above.

The Finance and Policy Council are recommending to the incoming administration serious study of this matter in detail with a view toward bringing about any indicated improvement.

The larger number of pages in Vol. 22 was accounted for partly by the fact that the Proceedings papers were included, whereas they were printed by the California Association the preceding year.

Also, in Vol. 22 there were more excess pages, which were paid for by the authors. A part of the total cost of Vol. 22 was absorbed in this way (about \$500.00) but does not appear in the routine breakdown.

Rather than comment further on statistical details, the editor would like to use a little space for a brief discussion of a very important matter, which the increase in dues has suddenly brought into sharper focus.

When the increase became imminent, it not unnaturally caused everyone to make a quick review of all his expenses. Such a review would reveal an increase in the cost of practically everything, and the time was at hand for each person to decide whether he could afford each and every item in terms of the satisfaction or value which it represented to him as an individual. With AMCA dues at \$5.00, somehow the question did not loom so large. At \$8.00, it came under scrutiny as one of the items that could be dispensed with, and many cancellations especially by field operations personnel have occurred.

Those members whose interests are several or many, usually find that scattered through each yearly volume will be a sufficient number of papers in one or another of their fields to make *Mosquito News* worthwhile to continue. Since this "editorial" is being written on February 12th, I might paraphrase a statement attrib-

uted to Lincoln so that it reads "You can satisfy all of the people some of the time and some of the people all the time, but you cannot satisfy *all* of the people *all* the time!" What we would like to do, is to satisfy most of the people most of the time. Where we seem to satisfy the fewest or the least is in the area of operations, i.e., the field work and field problems. Here, although I can state the problem, I cannot solve it. When the "operations" section was set up (see editorial on page 143 of June 1961, when this became a separate section), it was hoped that the section would expand, but a total of 7 pages out of 432, and 7 out of 500 in two successive volumes is not very encouraging.

Let us all put some constructive thought on the matter and see what can be developed. AMCA needs all its members and all its members need AMCA. [*Editor's Note*: During the meeting a plan was developed whereby Al Buzicky and Tommy Mulhern are undertaking to stimulate interest and facilitate contributions in this field. All members please give them your cooperation, especially if specifically requested for advice or assistance].

REPORT OF THE NATIONAL ADVISER, AMERICAN MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION  
1962

The National Adviser of the American Mosquito Control Association is an ambassador without portfolio. His position is not noted in the Constitution. It is an appointment by the Board of Governors and carries no instructions nor prescribed duties. But I dare say this would not give recipient of this appointment the right to think that he could hold office without performing.

There have been two National Advisers: first, Harry Stage, who received his commission in 1950 and served until 1954 when Robert L. Vannote filled the place until mid-1962. Both of these men are men with great energy, imagination and fortitude and they have performed as National Advisers with honor and accomplishment. Let us think back on their records. Harry Stage started the Good Neighbor Club which still plays an important part in the functioning of our organization. Bob Vannote successfully brought the wildlife and mosquito control interests to the conference table. There are many other duties that these men performed while National Adviser but these highlights still serve to demonstrate that a National Adviser to be worth his salt has to do something. It is a matter of precedent.

Unfortunately, my report cannot be one of accomplishment; rather, it is one of hope.

Your National Adviser has tried to fill in for Bob Vannote. He has attended 3 meetings of the National Mosquito Con-

trol and Wildlife Management Coordination Committee. Ken Quarterman, a distinguished member of this Association, was elected Chairman of this Committee and will give a full report of its activities at this meeting.

It is not my intent to give you a full report on this Committee and thereby detract from Quarterman's report. It will suffice to say that this is a working committee made up of members who attend and participate in the meetings and it can point to definite accomplishments. This Committee needs funds in order to carry out its work. A number of the mosquito control organizations have contributed. It is requested that the American Mosquito Control Association appropriate \$250.00 for this purpose.

Your Adviser has performed some other minor jobs requested by the Secretary and others involving writing and raising money but these have been of routine nature.

It is of the future I would like to talk. Idea #1—It is proposed that arrangements be made with a prominent research scientist who is about to change his previous connections. He no doubt will have in mind a research project in the mosquito control field which should be carried on. With this much to start on—and I might say that enough investigation has been made so that the above is more than pure conjecture—the American Mosquito Control Association will sponsor a request for

a National Institutes of Health grant. Of course, there will be other details to work out, such as a place to work, housing, etc., but it is felt that certain mosquito control districts can be induced to make appropriate arrangements.

This project, if approved, will put the American Mosquito Control Association in the research business and it is hoped the results would add to the prestige and service of the Association. If all the particulars are worked out it should be done without cost to the Association. If a National Institutes of Health grant is not forthcoming no doubt other arrangements can be made with a private granting agency.

It is proposed that the incoming President appoint a special committee of not more than 3 to investigate the details of the above proposal with authority to proceed towards its accomplishment.

Idea #2—Throughout the years that the American Mosquito Control Association has been in existence many of the members have seen their children grow from infants to college age. There are a number of mosquito control workers who

have had sons follow in their footsteps and no doubt there will be more. It is proposed to establish an undergraduate scholarship fund, separate from but as a subsidiary of, the American Mosquito Control Association. This would make available funds to the relatives of members and perhaps to other deserving students on the basis of aptitude and need. Study would be restricted to the field of the biological sciences.

The direction of this would be under a special committee appointed by the President with the approval of the Board. Funds with which to operate would come from special gifts and would be entirely separate from other Association funds.

If you feel that these proposals have merit, then efforts should be made towards their accomplishment.

Please be assured that I stand ready to do whatever I can in the promotion of these projects or to perform any other service for the betterment of the American Mosquito Control Association.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO REVISE AMCA BULLETIN No. 1 "The Use of Aircraft in Mosquito Control"

This Committee was appointed by President Geib last Spring and consists of the following individuals:

The first major problem encountered by the Committee was to secure sufficient copies of Bulletin No. 1 in order that each member could have a copy at his disposal. This was not an easy task as apparently this publication is quite rare. By an advertisement in *Mosquito News* and by other means, nine copies were obtained.

It became apparent immediately that Bulletin No. 1 was so far out of date that it would be impossible to attempt a revision based on the present format. The Bulletin is going to have to be completely rewritten.

By this time, most of us were well into our programs for the season and did not have the time to assume any extra work. We planned to get down to business in the Fall and hoped to have something resembling a format prepared for this meeting.

We were stopped cold at this point, however, when on November 7th the Federal Aviation Agency published a proposed revision on part 55 of the Civil Air Regulations that deals with agricultural aircraft operations.



These proposed regulations contain some stringent restrictions on operations that, if enforced to the letter of the law, would make it impossible for mosquito abatement districts or other governmental agencies to use aircraft for insect control.

It appears this new part 55 of the CAR was written with commercial agricultural operators in mind with no thought given to the operations of governmental agencies. Some of the most important points of the proposed new regulations are as follows:

A. Prior written approval of all property owners in an area in which an operation is contemplated must be obtained before the operation can begin.

B. Notice of the intended operation shall be given to the public by some effective means such as newspapers, radio, television, or door to door notice.

C. A plan for each complete operation shall be developed by the operator, coordinated with, and approved by, appropriate personnel of the General Aviation District of the FAA having jurisdiction over the area where the operation is being considered. Presumably this would include approval of the chemical to be used and in what dosage and formulation it is to be used.

D. If the FAA desires an annual report of operations it will be supplied.

E. Each operation will be required to maintain a handbook that will be approved originally by the FAA, and any changes you care to make at a later date must be approved by the FAA before they can be inserted. It should be added the contents of the handbook are spelled out in such detail that the chemical you use and how you use it would be approved by the FAA.

F. Each operator must pass an FAA examination for a commercial agricultural certificate, but a "grandfather" clause is included. We feel if an examination is required for one it should be required for all. The "grandfather" clause serves to perpetuate mistakes that have been made in the past.

G. The regulations are obviously writ-

ten for fixed-wing aircraft with little or no consideration given to helicopter operations which are drastically different.

There are many other points in the proposed revision that are of interest to us, but the ones outlined above are the most important.

Individuals who wished to comment on the proposed revisions were given until January 15, 1963 to do so.

In view of the importance of these proposed regulations, the Committee decided to suspend work on the rewriting of Bulletin No. 1 and to take it on themselves to inform as many interested organizations as possible of the potential danger imposed by this document and to encourage them to submit their comments directly to the FAA before January 15.

Apparently many agencies got their comments in on time, and this has created quite an impression with the FAA. We have been informed the deadline for submitting comments was extended to April 1st.

In Washington recently, unofficial information that was obtained indicates the proposed revisions (if indeed they are passed) will be greatly modified and more flexible than was indicated at first. An unofficial opinion stated they would not apply to governmental organizations, but this opinion was completely unofficial.

It might be possible to use the new Bulletin No. 1 as the handbook mentioned earlier.

Actually, as far as commercial agricultural operations are concerned, we feel these regulations are, for the most part, good. Reputable commercial operators feel the same way, since they can foresee a reduction in competition as the "fly-by-nighter" is driven out of business. But, these regulations, as written, must not apply to governmental operations, and we are not excluded or exempted at this time.

Perhaps we were unduly alarmed by this, but we thought it best to take the course of action we did rather than to wake up some morning and find our aerial programs grounded.

We would like to recommend that the

AMCA go on record with the FAA in this matter to the point of recommending that duly authorized governmental operations be exempted from any change to existing regulations that would adversely affect their programs.

With this problem seemingly solved, at least for the time being, the Committee is prepared to move on the development of a format for the rewriting of the Bulletin.

If it is the wish of the Board of Directors that we do so, we will meet sometime during the period we are here in Atlantic City and try to get the ball rolling. Member Rogers will be unable to attend this meeting, but he sent me his suggestions recently.

#### AMERICAN MOSQUITO CONTROL ASSOCIATION REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The Legislative Committee of the American Mosquito Control Association continued in its capacity as a watchdog over legislation introduced into the Congress which might affect our members.

The three major bills of interest in the 87th Congress were H. R. 4668 by Mr. John Dingell (Michigan); H. R. 2927 by Mr. Mendel Rivers (South Carolina); and H. R. 6403 by Mr. Thomas Downing (Virginia).

The contents of these bills were the subject of a report by this committee last year. Each proposal failed to receive favorable action before the close of the 87th Congress, and letters in this regard are attached as a part of this report.

Mr. Downing has introduced a new bill, H. R. 2486, into the 88th Congress which

substantially proposes the same legislation as before. A copy of this new bill is attached for your information.

No new legislation was proposed during the year either by a member, or the Legislative Committee. However, it is suggested that consideration be given to the formation of a committee to study the possibility of legislation which would enable mosquito abatement districts to participate in the federal surplus property program. This important source of equipment for mosquito control programs with limited financial resources should be made available to those who desire to participate.

#### COMMITTEE REPORT, GOOD NEIGHBOR CLUB 1962

Upon being appointed Chairman of the Good Neighbor Club Committee, my first act was to write all committee members asking for suggestions and ideas about improving the club. Seven letters were sent out and five answers were received. All of them gave some good suggestions, particularly concerning sending the *News* to universities and libraries throughout the world.

At the committee's request, a survey letter was sent to all members of the Good Neighbor Club, asking their present address, occupation, etc.; 119 letters were

sent, 40 replies were received. Many were returned for various reasons. From information received from the members, approximately 450 people are reading and using the *News* at the present time. It is difficult to determine the extent of the readers when copies are sent to universities and libraries.

As of March 1, 1963, we have 78 paid members, 29 un-sponsored members, and 13 memberships have been cancelled. Considering our dues increase, 78 paid memberships is good.

#### RECOMMENDATION

1. It is felt by the committee that there are a number of members who should be dropped because it is our belief they could become paying members. (W.H.O., etc.)

2. This program should be put on a purely voluntary basis. Each sponsoring member knows he has to submit his dues (without being dunned) and if the money is not in the hands of the Executive Secretary by the 15th of May, the membership is automatically cancelled. In the case of commercial concerns, they should be contacted by letter, asking for their contributions and desires right after the first of

each year. If the money is not forthcoming, their "good neighbors" are cancelled.

3. Every effort should be made to place as many foreign universities and libraries as possible on the "Good Neighbor Club" roster. These do not change. Also, the *News* should be sent to the "position" where possible, and not to the individual, as we know in many foreign countries the job gets a new "chief" very often.
