

## ASSOCIATION NEWS

AMCA BOARD OF DIRECTORS INTERIM MEETING,  
OCTOBER 14, 1979, SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

1. Approved minutes of pre-conference meeting of 1978 Board, and of the annual business meeting, and of the first meeting of the 1979 Board held at Washington, D.C., as printed in *Mosquito News* 39 (2): 400-436.

2. Directed the Executive Director to negotiate with NIH to try to obtain a higher indirect cost rate for the Bibliography Grant.

3. Directed that page costs for the Bibliography be included in the next Grant application to NIH.

4. Directed that the price of the color brochure and the color mosquito photograph be reduced by  $\frac{1}{2}$ , the new rates to be \$1.00 per single copy, \$.80 for 100 to 1,000 copies, and \$.75 for more than 1,000 copies.

5. Directed that the matter of printing and charging for cartoon booklets, and royalties paid to the author-cartoonist, be referred to the Publications Committee for review.

6. The nominees submitted by the Nominating Committee and accepted by the Board for the office of Vice President are Richard C. Axtell and T. Wainright Miller. Claude Schmidt is a single candidate for President Elect.

7. Directed that the Board accepts with regrets Frank Wilson's resignation as Regional Director of the South Atlantic Region.

8. Appointed James D. Gorman to replace Frank Wilson for the remainder of the term—to the April Conference.

9. Directed that the number of recipients of awards be limited as follows: Medal of Honor—maximum of 2 per year; Meritorious Service—maximum of 4 per year.

10. Directed that a new award be created, the "Presidential Citation Award," limited to 2 per year, for AMCA members and for nonmembers who have

contributed outstanding work for mosquito control but who are not eligible for the other awards.

11. Selected Dr. A. W. A. Brown as the AMCA Memorial Lecturer for the Salt Lake Conference, and Dr. Maurice W. Provost as the past member being honored.

12. Appointed an Investment Committee to include James R. Caton, John C. Combs, and Thomas D. Mulhern to work with the Treasurer on investment matters.

13. Directed the Investment Committee to report information to the Finance and Policy Committee for recommendations on the types of investments to be approved.

14. Directed that the present one free page in *Mosquito News* for all papers be eliminated beginning with the March 1980 number, excluding papers which have received prior approval for publication.

15. Directed that the Editorial Board will review all applications for waivers of page charges and decide whether waivers will be granted, following appropriate guidelines which it will establish, with the recommendation by the Board of Directors that these be tight.

16. Directed that the present waiver form be eliminated.

17. Directed that the size of each issue of *Mosquito News* not exceed 1 pound in weight, including wrapping.

18. Directed that minutes of Board business to be placed in *Mosquito News* be restricted to actions only.

19. Directed that condensed minutes of Board meetings be placed in the Newsletter.

20. Directed that advertising rates will be increased by 15% beginning with the March 1980 issue.

COMMANDER LANCE SHOLDT IS SENIOR AUTHOR OF A FINE TREATISE ENTITLED: "THE EPIDEMIOLOGY OF HUMAN PEDICULOSIS IN ETHIOPIA" published by the Navy Disease Vector Ecology and Control Center in Jacksonville, Florida (in hard cover, yet!). Even though the connection to mosquitoes is minimal, anyone who has worked in the tropics (or even in the warm parts of the U.S. prior to WWII) will find the subject of interest, particularly as it covers societal attitudes and environmental influences on disease vector control

programs. Interesting, too, was a reference to studies suggesting that Type O blood people are preferred by *Anopheles gambiae* and even a suggestion that the distribution of AB & O types might have been determined this way, through malaria and yellow fever. No reproducible proof, but an area worthy of further study perhaps.

THE NEW WHO PUBLICATION, "ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH CRITERIA 9: DDT AND ITS DERIVATIVES" is announced in English and the French edition being prepared. The press release starts out, "The effect of DDT on the environment is an emotive subject," which is surely a front-runner candidate for the Understatement of the Year Award.

21. Directed that death notices may be announced in the Newsletter, but formal obituaries would be placed in *Mosquito News*.

22. Directed that "Newsletter" be printed as one word.

23. Directed that the Newsletter adopt a volume/number system, starting with 1980.

24. Directed the Executive Director to determine whether state or regional associations or local districts which advertise in *Mosquito News* would accept their advertisements being placed in a condensed listing in *Mosquito News* or in the Newsletter.

25. Directed the Executive Director to determine those subscribers who are not interested in receiving the Newsletter, and drop them from the mailing.

26. Directed that News and Notes remain in *Mosquito News*

27. Directed that, for Bulletin 1, only the present Bulletin 1 Committee be listed on the cover.

28. Directed that, on Bulletin 2, a deadline of March 1, 1980, be set for preparation of each chapter.

29. Directed that, for the "Darsie" Key, this be titled "Supplement No. 1 to Mosquito Systematics."

30. Approved the decision by the Executive Director to accept the request of Kenneth Knight to change the rate of payment for the artist of the Key.

31. Declared that Incorporation of AMCA in New Jersey be retained and that John Kuschke be appointed on a yearly basis.

32. Accepted the invitation of the Ontario Mosquito Control Association to host the 1984 Annual Conference in Toronto.

33. Accepted the invitation of the New Jersey MCA to hold the 1985 Annual Conference in New Jersey.

34. Directed that the name of the Extension Representative be added to the AMCA letterhead stationery.

35. Authorized Eugene Gerberg, Chairman of the World Wide Committee, to print and mail material which will permit development of a list of mosquito control workers world wide.

36. Directed that a notice be included in the billing envelope inviting members to contribute to the AMCA Foundation Fund, noting that any amount given would be a tax deductible donation, to provide for special projects to be approved by the Board of Directors.

Despite his serious health problems, David remained ever cheerful and optimistic, which is the way he will be remembered.

Besides his wife, Flossie, David is survived by 2 sons, David Scott, and Charles F., and 5 grandchildren. Flossie lives at 1108 Kooahoo Place, Kailua, Hawaii 96734, which is located on Oahu. The David D. Bonnet Memorial Fund has been established at the Bernice P. Bishop Museum, P. O. Box 19000-A, Honolulu, Hawaii 96819, where tax deductible donations may be made to support studies on mosquito borne diseases and Polynesian migrations.

37. Directed that AMCA provide up to \$200 to Lamar Meek for expenses to inspect the Historical Records System of the Entomological Society of America.

38. Accepted President Stokes' appointment of William Rapp to determine the dates of all state and regional mosquito association meetings and to help provide coordination with the goal of eliminating undesirable conflicts.

39. Designated Robert Washino and Eugene Gerberg as designated AMCA Representatives to the International Congress of Entomology meeting in Japan, at no cost to AMCA.

40. Directed that a letter be written to

ARPE requesting the AMCA be recognized as a qualified professional society.

41. Approved expenses of President Stokes to attend the "100 Years Anniversary Symposium on Malaria Control" at Calcutta, India, in January, 1980.

42. Designated Jay Graham as an additional AMCA Representative to the India Symposium, at no cost to AMCA.

43. Approved that AMCA seek sponsors for people to attend a workshop training session to be held by WHO, PAHO, and AMCA.

44. Directed that the 1980 budget for the AMCA President be increased to \$2,000.
