Re: Photographs of Early Mosquito Workers

Dear Dr. Knight:

The group photograph accompanying my short biography of Terzi in Part I of this year's *Mosquito Systematics* comes from Vol. 4 of the *Journal of Tropical Medicine* and appeared on December 2nd, 1901. It should have been acknowledged as such and I have duly apologised to the editor. Early numbers of the journal contain photographs of a number of early workers on mosquitoes, usually as members of groups. These photographs are not always bound in the correct place, at least in our run of the *Journal*, but for those who are interested the following is a list of founding fathers with volume number and date of the particular part in which they appeared. Manson and Daniels, as members of the staff of the London School of Tropical Medicine, appear repeatedly and so, somewhat later, does Stanton.

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
