World Flower and Garden Show

The exhibit consisted of an eighteen foot high tropical waterfall, set off by massive, large, tropical specimen plants. This necessitated construction of an artificial "Mountain" made of plaster. Jess Tomory, Carl Roth, and John Valadez built the massive scaffold structure, and the four pools. Marty Martinez Joe Erby, Bud Hallberg, Frank Perdomo and Rito Cervantes moved boxed Ficus elastica, and a dozen large Strelitzia nicolai in barrels and placed many other plants into position for best effect. A dead 20 ft. Oak was cut down from Tallac Knoll and served as a Broweliad tree on which were tied 76 Broweliads and Orchids. Billy Howk used a borrowed fook lift to manager six tops of feather rock into Billy Hawk used a borrowed fork lift to maneuver six tons of feather rock into position and then climbed the Bromeliad tree to add more plants. Don Woolley and Glenn Hiatt watched the whole proceedings with admiration for the skill of design and knack for beauty demonstrated by these seasoned Arboretum flower show exhibit creators. Only a Boa constrictor or Fir de Lance could have made this display look more like the real thing. Gerry Patten's rendering of this waterfall inspired the success it attained;
