July 10, 1891.

Dear Dr. Watson:

I trust that you are getting along well with your work this summer, and that there is plenty accumulating for me to do. Although the weather as a whole has been unfavorable, yet I have devoted all of the last two weeks to laying in a stock of the rarer Bariccs, and of the Mosses.

I have ended my work here at Orono, by a fifteen mile tramp yesterday, and one of ten miles today.
