There is also at thirt way for doing our buisiness stillwiz. I might finish the plants here without tool Sprague being present, if he was to make the Trawing and gave me a description of the leading colours or lay them on himself! Were they then not exact enough they might be altered or improved afternoonds, when I make proof sheets. Further as to your Idea of having the plates printed in colors I would remark that this might be done. But this would make the coloring afterwards very difficult and expensive. Therefore when I engrave the plants with fine lines, I can execute the coloring also very well, as you may see on the Truits plates which I die already for the Massachusetts Harticultural Society at Boston, and can contherefore the glate not under 15 Cts. The Cakesii Conradii 4, Guillardia amblyodon were badly printed for coloring I will take pains that I may find sometypefruits of

Magnolia acuminata. There are many young trees in our farests but few ald one which bear fauits.
