Jully mm -Springfield (Mas.) Saturday 14th May, 1853. My Dear Sir, I received your communication of the division the same day, for which I am greatly oblight you. It was my first impression that it was not worth while to tax you so much as to give you the trankle even of reading a reply. Thave only to state that I have always felt a strong interest in the botany of North America, & particularly in that of our new teritories, & of Mexico, and that Thave long been engaged in studies X in pursuits, for which ouch information would be highly useful. Thave made various attempts to obtain the result of the researches of explorers in Oregon, balifornia etc. but always (with one very recent exception) in vain. I have however been unable to obtain nony of The works that have been published on the bolany gregions much neaver home. Formerly I made great efforts to obtain Emerson's Work on the Trees and should of Massachusette, but was intirely unduccefsful. I took equal pains to obtain Dr. Torney's Flora of New York, but to no purpose. Teven troubled him with a letter of inquiry upon the outgest, but he could not addist me. Inever could get his & your Hora of North America. I once possessed a few numbers of it, which went-out of my hands quite contrary to my wishes. Then I troubled Dr. dorney with an other letter; but nis reply was that not a single copy of it could possibly be found. If late have heard of your Plante Wrightiand, and have had the good fortune to obtain the first & second parts of it, that the work might be for sale, since I could make no claim for a gratuitous copy. I then made inquiry about the Planta Lindheimeriana

and the Manta Themanteand, the Manta Feid. leviance, Dr Torrey's manager Botanical Report on Great Salt Lake, accompanying bapt. Stansbury's Report, and also a botanical paper by Mr. Nuttall in Vol. I. Brt. 2 of Transactions of Amer. Acad. 1848. I have however received information that none of these are to be obtained, having been published by Institutions, that mever sell their Transactions etc. I think it is greatly to be regretted that a few topies are not is sived for dale. I have here. tofore endeavored to obtain copies of some of your publications, but have never succeeded except with your Botany of the Northern states, and your elementary, it seems that my inquiries have been communicated to several gentlemen, that I should never have thought of troubling. Dr. Jalter has kindly offered to borrow for me, from some public library, what singuire for; but I make it an invariable rule never to be deviated from, not in any case to borrow any thing that can not be purchased for replace. ment, if it happens to meet with any accident, while in my possession. My few books have more than once just escaped being burn t,x books of mine have been burnt, while in other, persons' hands, & books too, that could not be replaced. This has confirmed my rule. I give you many thanks for the trouble you have already Taken to permith what I want, but unless you happen to terrow where the books that I want can be purchased, my wants are . not so imperious, that they can not remain un. gratified. In all probability, yours & br. Jorrey's He. that I have inquired after, though it must be deficient in many Mexican & Californian plants
