

Davenport Iowa Aug 18th 1866

My Dear Dr Gray

I have for a long time been waiting
for a good excuse to drop you a line, hoping thereby to
merit a return. — So here I comes in the shape
of a nice addendum to the Northern States Flora,
Sida hispida Sh from Rock Island Ille within half
a mile of my residence!! The history of the discovery
is this. I was enjoying a brief visit from our good
friend Dr Engelmann who was called up here by
what might have proved a distressing circumstance
he had sent his son George up the river to spend
vacation; and was staying with me a few days on
his way, complain'd of diarrhoea which he had contracted
on the boat, which with quiet & rest we hoped might
pass off. but two days after his arrival cholera symptoms
supervened. and I telegraphed at once to his father
who got up in time to find him fairly convalescent, in
the mean time we heard that the boat from which
George debarked here had 13 deaths from cholera between
her and St Paul. So that the escape was a very
narrow one. Dr & Mrs Engl. staid two days for George
to pick up strength enough to travel, and left
for St Louis last evening — Well, the anxiety of the
case being removed the Dr & myself made some

excursion in this neighborhood. Mainly in search of Lance
in which we had very poor success. and were about
returning home. when on a shelving rocky ridge I
observed a single plant of the enclosed. being attached
by the singular capsule. Dr E. at once recognized
it as Iida hispida Ph. which he had found 30
years before in similar locations at St Louis Mo.
Making a careful search we found it quite abundant
and I can supply you with any number of specimens
desired. - There seems a discrepancy in the
description in NATL referring to the Georgia
plant which Dr E thinks may be distinct from
the western. probably you have specimens from
Dr E. original ~~specimens~~ from St Louis. though
none of the books I have contain any reference
to that locality =

I am at present occupied in a short paper on
"The character of snow accumulations in the Rocky Mts.
and certain features of the alpine flora" &c I find
some very interesting deductions flowing from a
review of the subject. will publish in the next
Vol St Louis Transactions. Hope to hear from
you shortly. as you are probably now enjoying your
Summer vacation.
