

Empire City Col-Terr. Sept 16th/72

My dear Dr. Gray

You are certainly home by
this time & I shall hear from you. I have
to keep on the keen jump now. seeds ripening
& falling out since frosts. I shall have to offer
to the conifers this week. I am in doubt
whether to send with cones. I think however
for the benefit of the seeds I will send in this
shape at least Abies. 3 sp. P. austata.
Pinus flexilis is not perfecting seed this
year I can get perhaps 30 cones which
I will offer with I think now of shipping
cones in heavy one sacks containing about
 $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel. I have packed waiting an orange
box No 1 of roots containing Peucestesum humile
50? Calochortus venustus 200. Ledum rhodanthemum
10? Talonum pygmaeum 20? Claytonia arctica 6
Calypso breaks 4. Trifol Panagi? 15?
Lentaria fusca varia 100. The last from the
bulk of the box as I have taken up roots
with earth which are in excellent condition
the whole packed in moss. box weighing
about 25 lbs?

I think better to send small boxes & express. The mail would be much cheaper but they are so particular about the way of packing up, and do not allow any marking either names or numbers that I fear it would cause confusion & waste of time. equal to the difference in expense. I shall send probably 2 more boxes this week one containing seeds. These will go direct to Denver by Mr. Byers team, who is now in Middle Park (Young Putnam accompanies him).

A list of contents of boxes will be on the left (inside) as soon as I have time. I shall take up Pauls Peak & Eruption Antennaria &c Nelson will tell you that I trouble on Parholstein Hartmii on Mt. Flora when I must have passed it 20 times. It is shy in flowering. I will try & get seed & a few roots I want to try & get through here by the week in Oct & then do something in the plains before going to Denver for the winter as he be here this week or

next on a Missionary tour to a poor brother he will stay with me a few days. I write to Mr Beckhouse every week to post him in my progress. I have finished up my dredge plants for the season Containing sets number up to 115 besides other irregular specimens calculated in all 2500s. You might like indeed any time for Catalog sets at \$12, or give an advertisement to the Naturalist. Dr Torrey did not make his appearance being late I suppose he hurried home. I would like to write up Prof's Peak after getting all the data desirable to do up the subject properly including my own notes of 1862. I think Whitney is the great obstacle in fixing the name on Torrey's Peak and some one ought to talk plainly to him as it is clearly a matter of personal spite on his part Prof Guyot might help out the matter as he has measured both peaks & disagrees with Whitney in the measurements.

I'm well see Swank's paper speaking
"de cathedra" for Watts: I have been
taken up the cudsels in a printed
indication of the Phonological Survey
& the Museum. It is strong but not
exactly the right thing being mainly
a personal complaint. That his own
work was not sufficiently complemented
and rather exonerating the Commissioner
who is of course the responsible party.
They are very measy under Swank's
rule in the Dept. and think all will
be right of him (Swank) is gotten rid
of, but I hope the Commission will
keep him as long as he stays, as they
properly compliment me another. (one a fool
the other a knave). If we could only give
some of these politicians the lesson that
Worke has given Tyrelton & Gladstone
it would be well. Hope you get him
all safe & hearty
