We have our arrangements all made to leave for Denver tomorrow evening consequently I have been very busy finishing up my collection here, packing &c. I think I reported to you the contents of Box No 7. The numbers following 8 to 11 contain conifers seed in one sack ( $\frac{1}{2}$  bushel)

Box No 12 (not quite finished) will contain from the bottom up Gentiana officinalis too good roots? and a very choice plant

Eryngium glabellum 150 +

E. Macrantha? 100. I find nothing but habit to distinguish these two species will have plenty of material to clear them up -

Nardosma sagittata. 6.

of an assortment, including some  
Duplicates, will add to them what  
I can pick up on the route & in  
the vicinity of Denver & make up  
a parcel. I shall take with me  
to Denver all the packages, from 5 to  
12 measures, & express from there will

will have to fight out the Abies  
question with Engelmann who has full  
material. It is funny that I should  
have to agree entirely with Engel that  
A. Engel does not stand into A. Miquelian  
and now you take up my old notion that  
A is a form of A. alba. I still think  
A is a good species and there is only  
one here ranging from 5000 to 10000 ft.  
and holding its characters constant. The  
thin pointed scale of the cones, and the

thin scaly bark (Look at your wood)  
specimen sent you several years ago  
compare with A. alba growing with you.  
I forlornly anticipated your wishes &  
sent you a fine fruiting branch (by mail)  
from near where you saw it. I dipped the  
branch in boiling water to retain the  
leaves. As to A. grandis you will get  
a bag full of cones mostly fallen to  
pieces. Which will need reconstruction to  
compare with A. balsamea. A few specimens  
tied up in gauge are packed away somewhere.  
I am not so certain about its being  
distinct from your old species. I have  
seen fresh branches again to Engelmann.  
Torrey saw it but did not express an  
opinion on A. I hope the thing will  
be straightened out soon.

So now I shall soon be through with  
my seasons work. Which I hope may  
prove satisfactory, but perhaps not up  
to the mark in quantity. I only know  
that I have been conscientiously active  
to the full extent of my physical ability.

and if I have not done enough I must be made right by Knobley & the L's

One other point. in case I go back to Davenport next week. There may be time for me to take off a run up to Minnesota & collect Aspidium fragrans which I suppose will be in the best condition for transmutation. You know I have not been at the locality since 1848!! but I hardly think the location can have been altered, occupying as it does an extensive range of precipitous rock rocks. I suppose I might get to the locality & do the necessary collecting, at an expense of \$30. to \$40. now the question is whether it would pay say for making a collection of over 1000 plants? Let me know what you think about it & write at once to Davenport Iowa. As long as I am expressing I shall not need to use the gutta percha, but when I finish packing, it will come in use I may get the 2<sup>d</sup> parcel of tomorrow's mail before leaving In haste Yours C.C.
