

Davenport Nov 27<sup>th</sup> 1874

My dear Dr Gray

The Lyciums 201. & 202  
are clearly distinct.

No 201. A much smaller bush 2°-3°,  
narrow leaves & corolla; bright red  
berries (specimens enclosed);  
flowered <sup>1<sup>st</sup> May.</sup> 3 weeks earlier than 202.  
in fl while the other (202) is in fr.  
grows on dry hill sides. a slender  
branching bush with a profusion of  
flowers. quite handsome in fr.  
fruit ripe early in June.

No 202 A much larger bush. 4°-6°  
broader leaves. larger fl. (latter part  
of May) blue berries (sic Johnson)  
not ripe when I left June 25<sup>th</sup>  
grows on dry alkaline bottoms  
hardy L. Andersoni?

Lycium

A single very broad-leaved species  
with a single withered fl, no fr,  
collected at Pini valley, is in the  
collection.

I call No 147. Eunanus Bigelowii?  
you say in your list E. Fremontii?  
I shall get at my collection  
again next week has been  
scattered & boxed up for a month.  
They will not print in Nelsonia I  
think. No. but I have sent  
a manuscript for 3 No's!  
Ogilman - is lively again  
will publish some I hope.  
Backhouse was so pleased with  
this year's collection that he sent  
£25 - more than our agreement &  
wants me to collect next year for  
\$ £150 -
