which, ???

I do not quite see the point
in your uncircumscription

N. wrenii. It seems to be a
constant and diagnostic character
in the separation of the corolla
& staminal crown. Hence
my suggested name of Coronata
The line of separation seems

sharply defined. See another specimen
in parcel.

But now turn up another
species (enclosed in parcel)
— unfortunately a single specimen
brought me by the mail rider
from South of St George. If
new I leave you characterize it
and of course keep the typical
specimen in the Herbarium. It is
very neat & the long appendages
to the filaments afford a good
distinguishing character. But you
will write it up as my new
a Calocarpum species.
