My dear brother
Your letter of
the 14th to hand. I am
now in Botanical claves!
How nice to be able to find
things without guessing, or
going over a dozen or more
bore pamphlets -

Palmer just started off for
San Luis Obispo. I suggested
this intermediate locality
which includes some high
adjoining mt districts, where
Abies bracteata is found.
I think seldom visited by
collectors; Lemmon & I
not seem to take to the

Colorado scheme, which I suggested to him first and rather urged on him. he is active, but occasionally nervous & fidgety does not like to stick to steady work, and likes to make a display of what he does besides being short of funds. He is a thoroughly good fellow and I would like to see him do well. He is still at Sta-Barbara where you no doubt hear from him. I fear wasting valuable time which would be better spent in the Previa. I am likely to stay here till middle of July & then work north. expect to return to Sacramento early in Sept with all the collection including to Palmers. who will come on later & make

up his sets there. under my direction.

I think he will do well enough in collecting the Colorado Conifers. I shall give him very full direction in reference to localities & persons to call on. he will make good quarters at Empirum. I hope this will be satisfactory to Sargent. he fully understands that the pay is to be proportioned to the size of the collection.

I have a parcel of Palmer late gathering in hand to which I want to add a few large things. We shall have some correction & addition to the Flora, among them we find Androsace septentrionalis here on the foot hills. first seen by Loomis
