

San Luis Potosí July 8th 1878

Dear Dr. Gray, glad to get a sight of your
hand, once more through Mrs. P. I appreciate of
course the reasons of your long silence but
you need not be "afraid" to say so.—
I have now fully made up my mind to
pull up firm here last of this month &
~~take~~ overland route to Texas collecting as
much as I can on the route sloping over
at Saltillo from there going to Brownsville
or San Antonio. I take my collectors with
me, and will arrange to have Palmer stay
and finish up here. he is still in Mexico
but I expect him back this week when I
shall pack up & be ready for the first
train north. It will be a good time
to pass over this dry ditch & I hope to
pick up some nice things, besides getting
a connected series of observations.
I enclose herewith some scraps lately picked
up, which may interest you especially the
curious *Membranous Caryoph.* *Ceratia*, of which
H & B say "a rara non visca". I am not sure but
the 22, sp. is here also. I also enclose *Vida Barroetae*
which Schaffner names in his, but not published.
If it should prove a good n. sp. please publish
as it properly can incriminate a very worthy man
though I don't think much of the author.

I have been half tempted to give Schaffner
a lesson in politeness, in as strong Castilian
as I can muster, but conclude on the whole
to let him alone till I write up my observations
when I shall have a good chance to show him
what gently in enthrall with our friend Bainoceta
since weeks ago I addressed S. a note asking
the privilege of examining his collection of
Aguar, to which he has deigned no reply
so that furnishes us with our personal intercourse
Bainoceta got the pamphlets all safely &
is much pleased, he will be useful in time
but it is best to specify just what you
want him to send, he might send many
things by mail to Sargent if he was supplied
with suitable envelopes & wrappers
I send things at random to Sargent, some
of which may reach him in fair condition,
among them a dish shaped tuber Piperomia,
which will make a nice pot plant. grows in
dry rock crevices, what I have called
Aguar Engelmanni of which I have a large
supply of seeds Engel says "Bescharreria,"
glad to hear of the progress in Flora
Index &c - My work here will I think prove
more interesting in its relation to US Flora
than you suppose, equally in the presence
and absence of western genera. S/ "Max"
