Los Angeles April 12th 1881

Dear Watson

I am tied up here
very impatiently waiting to break up
an agree contracted on my last
trip down the coast as far as
San Luis Rey

Picked up a few desirable things
but hardly enough to pay me for
shaking. This is my chill day. but
I think I shall start. At ~~off~~
as I am now digging with a heavy
dose of quinine

As soon as I get well enough I
shall go up to Tulare & collect
Stanfordia. probably go as far
as San Francisco & perhaps on
my return stop at Fresno & see
Carpenteria??

After that have promised to meet
Freese at Silver City who will
return with me to California

There are many things on the Mojave Desert to be looked up and I shall try & start the herbarium on the hump as they are active & ambitious. They are making now excellent specimens of rare plants and are very nice promising fellows. My Boghiania solandriifolia is the common species in Mt. about San Bernardino. It flowers late. Parry will collect it in quantity if

My Hesperomeles speculation, turns out a complete failure (commercially) when I went down to secure bulbs latter part of March every trace of the plant has disappeared buried in blown away in a sand storm. Fortunately Vasey made out to collect about 20 good fl. specimens and I have bulbs enough to test fully its adaptation to cultivation. No capsules secured.

On a little side desert trib we secured some nice plants. one "new to Cal" (Jones) - Calandrea among them

Melacanthus platylepis
Fagonia californica.

Chrysanthemum corrugata

Pencephalanthus Schottii this last a regular shrub 2-3 ft. high with a stem over 2 inch diameter. I never liked calling it Pachystelis. See gray Some other things I do not think of just now

I enclose some scraps with notes accompanying

I sent you specimens of Holocantha Eriomorpha to Sargent one for gray Herb. That leafless shrub from Mojave is strange & quite unknown to me.
