My Dear Dr Gray

It will not do for me to let

the holidays pass without sending you at least a  
kindly greeting, and wishing yourself & Mrs Gray a  
happy New year (in which Mrs P. earnestly joins).

In fact not a day has past for many months that  
you have not been in our thoughts. I need only  
mention as example a most delightful week spent  
last November at first Bidwells magnificent  
country seat, where you are most kindly remembered  
and on our various drives over the Bidwell Ranch  
your visit with Mr Gray, Sir Joseph Hooker &  
Mr Muir were a constant topic.

Now I must say at least something of Botany  
as I am finally settled down to winter quarters  
with every convenience (except books) knowing the  
pressure that would come upon you on your return I  
have withheld much I wished to consult you about  
and now only venture in a partial distribution of what  
my specially interest you without taking up too  
much of your time.

I was very glad to draft you nice names for  
my new genus Eriogonum & now send specimens  
with printed labels. — also the 2 n. sp. of Oxytela  
B. Parishii & B. canophylla dcs. of which I have

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Lent some time ago descriptions & revision of  
the genus to Dr. Asa Gray Proceeding of which I fear  
the printing will be delayed by the death of  
our dear promising friend J. D. Poinsett in  
10<sup>th</sup> most.

I also send a very curious Cordylanthus, near  
to C. mollis but can hardly be a mere variety it  
is from near Stockton on salt flats. I hesitate about  
naming it C. clavatus or C. spicatus??

I also enclose specimen gathered within a week  
of Antennaria cyathiformis. Benth? collected at  
Maricopa on the Gila.

What is the enclosed Lycium -- - as from New  
Gila. I have others that I feel doubtful about.  
A curious lilia yellow fl' from Merced collected  
in June. can hardly be S. Breweri.

also L. leucocephala from near Los Angeles. which  
looks queer.

Mr Greene has probably sent you his S. heterodoxa  
which we collected together in Napa valley in  
June. Mr Greene has conferred with you on  
Heniguria on to which we have made some new  
additions I collected H. plumosa in fine condition  
in Oct. near Antioch.

Lemmon keeps busy but erratic and somehow  
manages to keep in hot water with his botanical  
associates. He is greatly elated over the new Phemeris

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in compliment to his wife "Amabilis" —  
he terms her. They seem to be struggling  
for want of means to live on which may  
account for some of his peculiarities. He  
I presume have lately had a serious falling  
out for which I am sorry as he needs all  
the friends he can keep. The Parrot brothers  
in San Bernardino as you will learn from  
Watson are turning out M Class collectors  
and nice intelligent men. It was one of Lemmon's  
blunders to have had a falling out with them  
also. Which I have been trying with poor  
success to make up.

My own botanical ambition is narrowing down  
in the desire to perfect our knowledge of imperfectly  
known plants from living observations. and encouraging  
younger men to enter actively the field of discovery  
that is now being opened by RR extension.  
But tell me is it true that "dear old Bentham" is  
dead? I only saw the briefest notice from an  
Australian correspondant. and hoped it might  
be a mistake! such a wonderful worker who  
has compassed the world with his systematic  
labors his loss would make us all mourners  
I must close at present. Regards & compliments
