

Davenport Iowa Aug 17th 1882

Dear Watson

I have had an envelope on my table addressed to you for several weeks! expecting to send every day. but put off — for more complete? items. Now I must fire off what I have got in hopes to hit you before or after? your vacation?

I am still wrestling with Chorizanthes and have now been over nearly all the species in my possession which lacks only 4 or 5 of being complete. / and very full specimens. I have extracted the embryo from all but one or two, and have observed the germination of several I have had in cult. C. perfoliata. C. Fernandinae & C. Xanti. So that I ought to be pretty well up. I am satisfied that the species with lateral radicle & accumbent cotyledons will form a natural group. following Centrologia, & take in C. spinosa. C. rigida & C. membranacea. I am now anxious to see C. polyanoides to see when it comes with the Rattas who said his specimen were all eaten up by Rat² (not Rattas?). I presume your material is scant. but if you can spare a fragment or enough to show the embryo I should like it.

besides these I lack my C. whaleri, C. Breweri,
C. laciniata (probably any form of C. fimbriata), and C. valida?
Though I may perhaps have the latter from Acad Herb 87
(of which I enclose fragment). I will before long send
in the herbarium a set that will please you.

As to Oxytheca which I have not yet grappled,
Wright sends me a large stock of O. niermis,
and with it a very diffuse form of O. Caryophyllacea
spreading over 18 inches with the involucres constantly
pedicillate. I can't make anything else out of it
though Wright was so anxious for a n sp. that he
had labels printed "B. Wrightii Peary inv" which will
be likely to stay so. Then again Symonogonium? well
have to go somewhere and I am strongly inclining
to your view regarding the subtending 5 cleft bracts
as an involucine. Such of course Symonogonium.
Let her smash — So you see in my pottering
way I have plenty to keep me busy with no
time to quibble (even with Jones). I have just
shipped 1300 sp to British Museum — so much
out of the way.

I still expect to leave for the West. Though
perhaps not before Oct. It has been so completely
cool here that I do not pine for Cal^a Distr. though
occasionally craving the fruit.

Yes you may as well send Mr Palmer parcel
his plants, of which he has several times written.
though supposing they were plainly marked. I did
not feel anxious about. To make up the
parcel you may also (if convenient) include
Vol 2. Pt Cal. of which I do not yet own
a copy. am borrowing the Acad. copy, send bill for
same and I will remit by Postal order

You have Engel there now, and of course a
lively time. do not keep him too long. but
Send him back here to me.

I must tell you a good joke about Sheldon (who has lately lost
his wife) over 10 years ago. He deposited in Savings bank to the
amount of \$1670.5 and forgot all about it. till the bank officials
advised him interest & all new amount to over \$3000. ! He
was astounded.. but referring to some old records found the entry!
Are you never coming to see us?
