Hope I may turn up again. well

Laphania brasiliensis & Cowania mucifolia,
I am just getting ready to start back
to California. While Mr Parry goes
East to Conn. I have promised
Pringle to go with him to Sta Lucia
Mt to get Abeia bracteata. Then
I shall also run up to Chico &
see Mr. Greene & Bidwell.
I send before leaving a small
parcel. mainly of Chorizanthe & Oxybaphus.

I do not like to trouble you with odd things, but I am a good deal exercised over Arctostaphylos. The Lower Cal. plant does not agree well with the Mexican 564 P + P. I hope to get fruit of the Lower Cal. sp. for further comparison. There I have still another distinct species of the same section in fl only also from San Diego. I shall send you a specimen of the latter which I call parvissima A. Sanfridii after the collector who promises to get the fruit.

My winter plans are not perfect I cannot decide till I get to Cala I propose to work up a number in which I may need your assistance viz to transfer my whole collection books &c to the Cat^a University. at Berkeley provided some of those

million. Stanford Crocker & Co
 will pay me a fair price &
 establish a botanical Dept in
 the University. I do not want to
 undertake instruction of classes. but
 I think some would, and I would
 act as Curator till the collection
 was put in workable shape This
 is my plan if I can carry it out?
 I want to make another suggestion.
 If everything is favorable I propose
 to spend part of the winter in Sonora
 and by the latter part of winter you
 will want a rest. So you might
 work on the Boston RR officials &
 get pass for yourself & Mr Gray
 and come down at Joni me either
 at Tucson or Hermosillo in time
 to see the early spring flora. and
 the wonderful Cacti of that
 region. how does it strike you?

I am all ready to leave on 25th
inst. I have finished the biographical
sketch of Duncan Putnam which
now goes to print. The family seem
pleased with it. Though I had my
fear, that they might expect too
much. I tried to bring out the
chief salient points in his
character & leave off minor
details that would not interest
the reading public. You will see
I soon & I can judge how far
I have succeeded in this labor of
love. My address for the present
will be Canfield & Co San Francisco
I shall see you among his "the wood"
while enroute to Watson later about
Chrysanthemum &c.
