Prof. Asa Gray,
Dear Sir,

Your kind note
of Oct 17, with its contents were duly
received; please accept my sincere
thanks for them. I have delayed
my reply in order to dry a fern
I found since I wrote, and also to receive
the 5th, 6th, & 7th nos. of a new folio published
by Bradbury & Evans. London, entitled;
"The Ferns of Great Britain & Ireland, by Thomas
Moore, edited by Prof Lindley, and Nature-printed
by Henry Bradbury." The plates are printed
in colors life size. I send herewith several
ferns, which if you will name for me
I shall be exceedingly obliged.
Nos 1. 2. & 3. I suppose are varieties of *Polypodium*
vulgare. 1 & 2 from rocks. Benicia. Cal.
3. from Maple trees. Fort Oxford. S.W. Oregon.
4. I have another which I do not send. it is

very thick & coriaceous. pinnae obtuse, veins many of them anastomose, grows in Oregon on Trees, 100-250 feet from the ground. I send a little penciled outline of one of my specimens.

I suppose it is the P. Californicum of Kaulfuss, and the P. intermedium of Hooker & Arnott. What do you consider it to be? I have but three specimens, but if you would like one I will send it to you.

5. is my n.sp.? of Steven Allosorus. Has it been found already?

6. is from the Dales of Columbia river. I can make nothing out of it.

7. from Brattleboro Vt. C.C. Frost legit. 1855

I can not make this agree with anything. It is too coarse for D. intermediata, & is in outline like D. spinulosa as figured in my new book cited above, but the indusium is that of D. intermediata.

8. From New Haven Oct. 1855. I suppose I must call this D. Cristata, but it is very different from all my other specimens. It is more like D. Fibrosa.

9. Aspidium acutum of Kaulfuss. What is it called at present?

10. From Oregon I suppose it is a Lycopodium but do not know the species -

Last spring I had the good fortune to see Dr Torrey; he spoke of some new work in splendid style on the American ferns, but after diligent enquiry I can find out nothing about it. Can you tell me what it is, & how it may be obtained?

I see in the last edition of Hort. Brittona (1853). page 401 a notice of a Lycopodium like the one I sent you a year ago.

I omitted to speak of the Oreades, but that will speak for itself. I gathered it in last August at Brattleboro, Vt.

My New Haven specimen is smaller & has dark fruit. in the oblongolate & somewhat revolute leaf.
Please retain the present specimen.
