I suppose you may have
heard of her adventures,

her propellor some 200 miles
S.E. of Newfoundland, & had
to put back under sail in
a fearful gale. The sails

were torn to shreds, & the
ship was at one time turned
side to the waves. The propellor
broke Jan. 18; on the 21st or 22^d
they signalled the Braunschweig,
but lost it again until four
days later, when it took
them in tow & brought them
into port at Southampton.

Four days later Mrs Hoppin
sailed again in the Necker,
& came home safely.
