nothing extraordinary - the cones you sent  
- You say, you used to see large Cones  
- but you can not produce them!  
we ought to see and compare.

I wish Mrs. Chattock would try  
to procure the large and perfect cones  
from his neighborhood for both of us.

I must have informed you that  
Mizander is unknown to me, Foresteria used  
to be common here and ripens in June  
will recollect next year. Now comes  
Planckon and wants Planera.

In the note on *Y. gloriosa* <sup>in Sillim</sup> you  
might have left out the words;  
"like that of *Y. filamentosa*" for they  
differ just from those by indecisive  
never mind.
