and that - justice to science requires
that - you deny them. if you find that
what I gave for facts and new facts, are
only my imaginations. I really think
that, if you will look into this matter, you
will see that - you have exposed yourself to
criticism by not writing into the character
of your Heterodonta the essential characters
which I indicated for it as a genus. But,
as I have intimated, when I am ready to
take up such a matter publicly, I shall
find no dearth of illustrations; for American
botany abounds in them.

A few duplicates of plants of
my own collecting within the past
two years will be forwarded to you
shortly. Do not trouble yourself to
acknowledge receipt of them. They will
go into the Gray Herb. naturally, I suppose;
unless you find them needless duplicates.

It is clear as can be, from the fresh flowers,
that - Trifolium appendiculatum, of which I send
specimens, must be admitted as a species; and
I guess it is somewhat rare and local.
