My dear friend, I regretted much that I missed
the opportunity of seeing you & your "Sauti" far better
part" when you were on here. Unfortunately I was
sick at home, when at the same time I found you,
John was still more so at his Lodgings, otherwise I
must have seen you at Trinity, which I understand
you visited. — However accept my tardy felicitations,
& present the same with my respects to Mrs G. May
God bless & prosper you both. — I am delighted with
the first part of your Genera, which I got from Dr. Selye
on its advent: no judice, it goes ahead of any thing
yet published in this Country as a classic botanical
Work, & I shall be much disappointed if you do not
find it warmly welcomed in Europe. — I safely

Bremen. Engelmann has been advised by him of same,

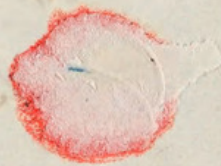
