My dear friend, I regretted much that I missed
the opportunity of seeing you & your "Soul, far better
part" when you were on here. Unfortunately I was
sick at home, when at the same time I ~~had~~ known
John was still more so at his Lodgings, otherwise I
must have seen you at Trinity, which I understand
you visited. — However accept my tardy felicitations,
I present the same with my respects to Mrs. G. May
God bless & prosper you both. — I am delighted with
the first part of your Flora, which I got from Wiley
on its Advent: me judicet, it goes ahead of any thing
yet published in this Country as a classic botanical
work, & I shall be much disappointed if you do not
find it warmly welcomed in Europe. — I safely

Thank you for your Agency in the matter. I enclose
you the amount say \$40^r in Dft. of City Bk N.Y.
on City Bk, Bos^r in your favor for 39³⁷. The
63 cents I have paid to John which he desires me
to tell you is the amount of shipping expenses on a Box
rec'd from Engelmann for S. Wissigens & shipped to
Bremen. Engelmann has been advised by him of same.

John is still very weakly, having had one or two Returns of Bowel Complaint, but is I think getting better.— His low spirits prey on his Health. He tells me how kindly you & Mrs. G. had pressed on him a Visit to Boston, connected with some botanical Occupation.— I think it would be very desirable for him to let him so, as a Circuit of Broad & Chase connected with his beloved study, would give him more Happiness than a better Employment drawn from the pursuit of Pleasure.

In the meantime I want you to do me a favor.— You & Mr. Olney long since proposed to him to join in the Purchase of a lot of White Paper, for your Herbaria. John's intended Size ~~is~~ ^{was} to be the same as yours, & I know he ^{has} not yet delayed getting any not likely to disburse the Post. I want to give it him, & shd. like to get it at once, as it wo^d. furnish him occupation just now.
