Professor Sereno Watson:

Dear Sir

I hope that you won't consider me too great a nuisance, for I want to trouble you again. This time I am perplexed concerning some species of Atriplex which I found at Grand Junction, Colo. I was there a few days in May and again in August for a day or two.

I noticed that you had named nearly all the species of Atriplex and for that reason send to you.

At G.J. Junction, I found Atriplex canescens, A. confertifolium, A. Nuttallii, A. expansum, A. argenteum, A. wolfii, A. patulus, var. hastatum and two more. One is a perennial and seems to be A. polycarpon of the Botany of California. The other seems near A. wolfii or A. Saccharin. The fruit is not ripe enough but that could not be helped. I found but two specimens one of which I send to you.

You may be interested in knowing that Salsola Kali grows near Denver. It is near the railroad track and has been recently introduced. Respectfully, Alice Eastwood.
