

Penfield Institute, Troy, Feb. 18th 1842

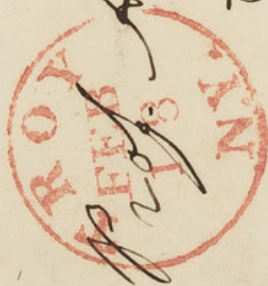
To Prof. A. Gray, of Michigan. (now in N. York).
