Dear Dr Gray

Please accept my thanks for the copy of your contributions to North-American Botany and your kind remembrance of my researches in the Flora of Tennessee. I have again this season on a few excursions picked up several things new for me. I also found a fine locality for *Eulophus* which I formerly found in a couple species near this City, but which does not exist no more in that spot. I have not seen it no more since 1866. I send you specimens in flower, seedling plant and fruit. You will see, it does not exactly agree with the descript in 5th Edit. Flowers are yellowish ~~root~~ not a cluster of tubers, but, while young thick and aromatic, in the fruiting state elongated spindle shaped. Biennial. The *Prunus pensylvanica* from the Thunder-head has much narrower & longer leaves than any specimen I saw before.

The Ophioglossum is stoloniferous.

The Solidago I can not smoke out.

The smooth, thickish, light green frond
renders it very distinct in the field amongst
other species. I found no tall specimens

If it should prove to be something
interesting, I would take some pains
to obtain a set for Curtis. I have
never seen S. Shortii. The leaves in
my specimen seem to be too small
for it.

Please and put me right about it.
