

Kew July 26 1802

My dear Gray

Your letter and the seed of *Odontostomum* have come at the right time and seem to confirm my views that the genus belongs to Conantheraceæ which I regard as a tribe rather of Hemiodoraceæ than of Liliaceæ. In each of the tribes of Hemiodoraceæ there are <sup>as in</sup> Bromeliaceæ genera with the ovary inferior half-inferior or free in all the embryo is not <sup>as in</sup> entirely enclosed in the albumen but is either marginal or more or less <sup>as in</sup> covered with the thick radicular end more or less distinctly protruded, and in making a vertical section of one of the seeds you send I find it like this <sup>as in</sup> nut as I have never seen in hundred of seeds of Liliaceæ that I have dissected.

I have not done the Peristoreæ yet but now on receiving your letter I look into the seed of *Orchis tremula* or *Zygadenus glaucus* which I find like this

The Orchidææ are now all printed off except the last sheet Scitamineæ and Bromeliaceæ are all in type. Hemiodoraceæ will be in this week. <sup>proof</sup> Epidiaæ and Aphyllideæ are in the printer's hand.



about 150 or 160 genera of Liliaceen are done  
but there are still some 20 or 30 species ones to  
examine and I cannot yet quite make up  
my mind as to grouping them - and the  
davis or Compositae Generum is very difficult  
to draw up

In the printed off portion there will  
be two or three corrigenda as to geographical  
distribution

Thanks for the faded flowers of  
Kesperanthes - I cannot consider them as  
spirally twisted the twist is very slight and  
rare and almost accidental

I made a great mistake in H. Australis  
in placing Myosotis in the spirally twisted  
genera - In first copying out my rough  
notes the word now was accidentally  
omitted and the error was not detected  
till after publication
