The gardens lie at the left, behind these  
houses - I enclose also the guide, which  
may amuse you to look over, & the maps  
help to understand some of my descrip-  
tions - You see where one map joins  
the other -

I have also put in the panel  
some Monograms &c. for the children -  
A young lady told me she made very  
pretty fans for "bazaar" (Am. Fair, &c) by cutting

My dear Sue,

I send these photos  
by Miss Foddard - If you go back  
to my journal you will under-  
stand the Cathedral better - In some  
I have put a pencil line, & then written  
on the back where Mr. Church's  
house is - The bishop's palace is  
on the left hand side towards you -  
~~in the garden view~~  
On the others I have put some ex-  
planations on the back of some -  
The "wells" or springs, supply the  
water for the Canals -

The garden ones, of Kew, I en-  
closed at the last when I had  
night - They were the palm house  
across the lake, & the interior of it -

Now I send the Museum No 2, where  
I used to sit outside a good  
deal - You see the lovely ivy over the  
front, & the flower-bed, very bordered,  
opposite the door - On the right is the  
fountain -

The large Temperate House you  
must compare rather with the man  
selling the walk in front of it, than  
with the lady in the near foreground -  
The great gates are where everybody  
enters - The Herbarium is the left  
in that photo - On the Herbarium  
photo the gates are hidden by the porter's  
lodge - The Herbarium is within the  
iron fence & gates - It is Cumberland  
House, the old residence of the King of  
Hanover -

If you examine the one of our

lodgings closely, you will see the  
~~hall~~ <sup>front</sup> of the churchyard round the  
church under the trees on the right -  
The church is on the green opposite  
Cambridge House - The projecting  
porch is built in front of the churches  
of Cambridge's house & drive a  
carriage under - The house we  
are in, is the other side of that little  
projecting shop front, the whole front  
is a door! Our house sits back, &  
Dr. Gray's dressing-room lies over the  
back of the shop, which is sliced in,  
apparently to use all available room -

The open stall near you is the butcher's,  
the next shop the new S. man's, where  
I got these photos, & who sells ink &  
needles, & papers & stationery - Next  
is a little Confectioner's -
