

Randolph, 4 August

Dear Mr. Drane: -

Your card of the 1st has come. I thought that A. simulacrum was rather more Coastal in range. I made a trip to Berlin yesterday and got 3 introduced plants new to the County: a Barbarea (apparently B. verna), Asteria paniculata, and a Polygonum of the auriculare group, but erect and from three to four ft. in high. It was sterile. It may be P. ramosissimum. I'll try to collect it again later. I also got Viola fimbriatula for the second time in the County, this time, as the first, in mid-way belt. Great abundance of Carex Michauxiana I found along the Dead River, and a few other interesting things. — The alluvia of Halimolobos fimbriatula I think we have had only from Randolph. The weather continues abominable, for the most part. Do you find any trace of any of the Juncus effusus group except var. Purshii? That is the only one of that species we have so far had in the County, but some of the more southern forms might perhaps be looked for there. Mr. J. H. Emerton has been here collecting spiders, and went twice to Berlin, Enos, and the Ranges. I had a letter from Mr. Sprague, in which he spoke enthusiastically of your kindness to him at Shelburne. My trip to N.N.H. and Ktaadn has had to be deferred for a time, since Dr. Tuckerman is not just yet able to go. With kindest regards to you from us all, A.S.P.
