Dear Mr Deane:-

I got your letter on my return from a trip to Ryer
Beach, Cambridge (where I listed all your plants at the
Herbarium), and SW. Maine and the Lake Umbagog Region. I
was interested in Mrs. C's letter. I was sure she must
change her statement in regard to the identity of our
common Danthonia.

As to Arceuthobium. You don't necessarily have to
have very elaborately developed utricles' brooms, but fine
specimens are often found on trees of an unhealthy
appearance, especially where the branches seem more than
usually leafy or subdivided into many twigs. Sometime
where you are here if you could walk up to the vicinity
of Tama Falls (about 1 m. from the Raine House and not over

much of an ascent) I can show you right by the Madison
Path many arbutus trees.

The plants in Cambridge I listed as you had de-
termined them with the exception of a very few cases.
When I differed from you I have scratched on a
little piece of paper what I called the thing and
tipped it in somewhere on the sheet.

On my trip I again visited Lawrence Pond in
Hingham; also Pleasant Pond in Brownfield and Lake Od-
eripsee, collecting especially at the latter. Among other things
I got there (at Lake O.) what seems to be Xyris flexuosa,
(along with much X. caroliniana), Lynceus terrellii (which
I had never happened to collect before), and some other good
things.

Best regards from us all. Mr. Rams' sister Mrs. Otis
is with us on a short visit.
