the lakes in that range that I have not yet visited. Soon I hope to take a trip
of a few days to the Oriskany region to look at some of the ponds there.

Chapman (Aston) house held it down against this wind. A rough measurement of
the rate of the clouds as they passed the mountains this a.m. seemed to indicate that
they were going 80-90 miles an hour. as. P.
