Partly from the difficulty of the leaf, & partly from bad manipulation, I failed in getting a good print of a single leaf of those you sent me. I have considerable confidence that I now could succeed better if I had a fresh batch of leaves. The leaves being young & sappy turn black so readily & obliterate the nerves. If you can without great inconvenience accommodate me once more, I would ask it as a special favor. If you conclude to do so please select leaves that are

large (the species being small) and
thin, & as free from down as
possible. Look through them
with your pocket lens, and if
you find the veining is already
largely obliterated, reject them.
This species, with one or two others
are the most difficult I have
to do with. If I can succeed
in getting a good print of but
one leaf, it is all I need.
