elms too.

I would like some
Eucalypta ciliata
from Maine &
Buxbaumia aphylla
or R. I. as being

interesting points of
distribution. I have
the *Eucalypta* from
Willoughby. It is one
small specimen &
the *Buxbaumia* is
quite plenty in this
granitic region
around the Blue
Hills. In the Torrey
Bulletin for Jan 95
I recorded the remark-
able abundance of
it for that year.
I have not seen it
so very plenty
since that year.

I send you some
Grinnia maritima
from Nahant.
I hope to find it
in fruit next spring.
There is only a very
little fruit & I
may not be able
to find fruit. I
got one specimen
with fruit, the
station is probably
the one referred to
in Desquerra's paper.
