Dear Mr Collins -

We came here yesterday
& shall stay prob. a month.
I find that my moss from
Mt Mansfield has two
specimens in it and I
hope you will find both
in what I sent you.
They are both Tayloria
one serrata & the other
tennis.

Serrata has the yellow seta,
teeth of peristome loosely
thrown back & areolation
of leaves closer,
Tennis has reddish seta,
teeth closely appressed when dry
and areolation very loose
& large.

you kindly sent me your notes
on distrib. of serrata, and
I would like to hear what
you have on tennis, as it
appears to be new to the
U. S. so far as I have been
able to find out. There is
no U. S. spec. in the Harvard
Herb; that is I found none
on Monday when I went
through some parts of the
Herb: but the mosses there
are not well arranged.
Mr C. E. Faxon advises me to
publish a note of this in the
Bulletin & I shall when I
have looked up the localities.
I shall be glad to hear whether
you have the two: I have plenty
of tennis, but serrata is not
so plenty in the herb.

I shall keep on collecting
here,
