The cells are papillose and the chlorophyll cells are triangular, situated on the concave side of the leaf. It appears to me to be *Sphagnum Austinii*. (Sulliv.) but as I am only a beginner in the study of mosses, I thought I would submit it to one who is better qualified to judge of such things.

I would like to know your opinion as to the name of the moss and its rarity, etc.

If this is not in your line, could you send it, or refer me to some one who is interested in the *Sphagnum*.

The plant is only found here in one limited area, but is fairly common in that area. I can get more if necessary.
