I have found it twice in Reading, Wase, in limited quantity. The servate leaves and the ovate terminal alle of the lamellar suggest P. gracile but I am not familiar with that species. I returned from California last May, I brought back some 60 species of California mosses, besides a number of Oregon and British Columbia mosses the latter I collected en route. I also have numerous lichens and hepatics from the Pacific Coast. you wrote me some time ago. that

you desired specimens of Polytrichaceae from the Pacific Coast. I have P. piliferum (sterile) from Southern Cal. and several species from Britiste Columbie. including Oligotrichum paralellum. also some interesting smarp forms of P. commune from Massachusetts. I should be glad to send you any of these if they interest you. I was invited to the meeting of the New England Botanical Club, 2 week ago. and was sorry not to see you there as I had hoped to meet you again. Jours truly. b. C. Kingman.
