11 Lowell St. Reading, Mass. Dec. 6. 1911. Dear Mr. Collins. Some days ago, Mis Dunham sent you a specimen of Polytrichum, collected by me, that interested you. Last week I visited the locality again and collected a lot more of it and so I am sending you some of it. The specimen A is the long slender form with appressed leaves. While I more nearly resembles the ordinary forms, but in this specimen there are many intermediate forms. It is for this reason that I am sending you the specimens Both A and B were collected within a few feet apart- They grew in a very wet bog, associated with Sphaguma

Torreyamme. - so wet that the roots of the Polytrichum were in water for part of the season at least. It was very abundant over quite a large area. It seems to agree uncroscopically with P. commune as far as I can see, but it looks quite different, both in the wet and dry condition: I have recently found Polytrichum gracile at Welrose, Wass. and my determination has been verified by Mrs. Dunleam. yours sincerely.
