

Cambridge July 17th 1854

My Dear Wright

I have your kind letters from Sydney, & from Hong Kong, the latter of the 9th April; and am glad to hear that on the whole you have got on so well, though trying circumstances. I expect that these difficulties will grow less, and that as you get into your real field of labor you will have better facilities, and a more comfortable time generally, as you direct.

I will send this letter to Hong Kong, and, to have it reach you the sooner (& make up a little for former dilatoriness) I forward it to a friend in England to be sent (post paid) by the overland mail.

(You use books on ship-board more than I thought you would. As soon as I got your letter ordering certain books I set about getting them for you. The Walpers came in fasciculi; and I got them neatly & strongly full bound. I should have sent all off to Baird at Washington, to be forwarded to you by the officials - some weeks ago. But I have waited till I could add to the package the 1st vols. of my Botany & Expl. Expedition, which contains many Sandwich Island plants that will interest you and impress you when there. That is now out, some copies just bound up - of the text - (the Atlas, & 100 plates - owing to Sprague's slow working is yet behind very much); and now the package is to be forwarded at once - through Baird, who was promised to put it into the custody of the Despatch Clerk at W.

I have been interrupted - 6 or 7 hours. It is now midnight. To-morrow is commencement, house full of company. I have to go into Boston tomorrow very early - mail the return to commencement. I regret that I did not

begin to write earlier. I must now despatch only a hurried and sketchy note. But I will write again soon.

Start the account enclosed. I will have to file the Requisition if Dr. Knobell will authorise the purchase for the expedition. Prof. Hill said the separate original bills if needed - tho' they are mixed up with some other books for myself -

Of course, if Uncle Sam does not take care for them the Albany M. S. expedition is to be a presentation to you from me.

I have not yet seen young Storer - he has not called. But I have heard about it from Knobell. Truly that a little knowledge should spoil people. But as I said before I think it will be better, and that you have been very judicious, and that you will reap the advantage of it in the respect of all, even the most ignorant.

I am glad you saw Mackay. I will write to him, and see if I can contribute to his collection to be

We know here. A long and busy time is just over. I fear I can go no work again at Albany. As I told you I had delayed M. M. right & in deference to Knobell. But now shall go about again. Tammie (who was lately here) tells me that Knobell will probably go out to survey the new

Mex. Boundary, which was right though that part of Sonora where your most interesting collections were made - and that his great Report will not go to press, probably till after his return. So I shall go on with M. M. right (enjoyably with Alice & N. America) and hope to do much this year.

Your old friend Bishop went across the country with Whipple to California. He has brought back good plants, some quail. Terry has already sent me - nearly all got in California except, not many from the eastern part of state.

Parry is married. His wife (a German lady - Alice)

Mrs. May has been to Nevada for 3 weeks - her first care time, with her father - this evening. I have hardly seen her yet. She sends warm regards.

I will write again to you positively without delay. Excuse this!
