Dear Dr.

I have been waiting impatiently for some time for another letter from your last bearing date (June), though I can conceive how the pressure of more important business must interfere with your correspondence with distant friends. Under date Ap 6<sup>th</sup> you say you will soon have some more books for my Mr. Bowles box of books has arrived safely in Houston but ~~though~~ I have heard nothing of the Spanish Dictionary though I wrote to New Orleans for it immediately on the receipt of your letter.

Since I last wrote I have been again to the Gulf of Mexico without however making a very interesting collection. For the last three weeks I have been hindered from doing any thing by sickness and now I have lost my horse and think it very uncertain whether I ever see him again. I intend making one more trip to Seguin and around by the San Marcos springs and see to which will close my active labors for the season. A part of my plants are at Seguin and as the means of transportation from that place to this are very uncertain I can not tell when I will be able to collect all my plants together for shipment.

I would have endeavored to make a collection of fall grasses & hyperaceæ ~~but~~ but the season has been so excessively dry that every thing of that kind is entirely parched up and it will at least be very late before any of those natural forms

will be collectible

Send you some specimens enclosed. The compound flower, you see, has a very short corolla with no border "at all almost". It is about a foot high and grows from a among post oaks above Austin.

The Gratiola was found at Beech Spring 12 miles from Austin with bright yellow flowers and grows about <sup>the</sup> margin of running water and on the

The other sp. of Nat. Or. Scrophularineae was found on the Pen Marcos - is a climber - is supported by the tendriliform petioles - flowers blue

The sp. of Gentianaceae grows on the Colorado & Quindahelpa prostrate flowers yellow

In my last I think I sent you some specimens from which I would like to hear an account still a collection of cryptogamic plants be worth a good compound microscope if so and any cryptogamist will send me one I will make <sup>for him</sup> next winter as good a collection as circumstances and situation will permit and a send it to him I cannot procure an instrument of that kind in this country & I very much need one I dont know where I shall be stationed next winter perhaps at Austin where the range for such studies is excellent.
