

San Marcos Apr. 10th / 50

My Dear Dr.

It is a rainy day & I occupy a portion of it in observation on your last two communications containing the letter from Washington

Immediately on the receipt of your letter informing me of shipment of paper on the Bark R. Welsh I wrote to Wm Hendley & Co Galveston to look out for it & forward to Port Laredo "care of Fulton & Hendley" to whom I wrote at the same time asking them to look out for it then I received answer from the latter that they woud receive it & give me immediate notice Fifty days since shipment have now elapsed and no intelligence of paper received I am afraid your neglect to send to a consequence will cause a fatal delay I gave you sufficient notice early in the winter of the necessity of making ^{timely} arrangements for next summer's operations and of the embarrassing delays attending commercial transactions here Suppose my letter to Hendley miscarries or suppose he neglects to attend to my requests or suppose the receivers of the loading of the Bark will not give themselves the trouble to hunt among their stores for the articles directed to me you see the consequences It woud certainly have been but little trouble to find ⁱⁿ a Galveston paper a commission house or by enquiry of the owners of the Bark

Again it seems I am dependent upon myself for my hauling knowing this I wrote to a friend in San Antonio to enquire for me whether I could hire hauling and received in answer that a carretero woud haul 500-600 pounds at \$11 per ^{cwt} but I can not make any contract until I receive the means of making an honorable one My hands are tied so far as making any definite arrangement ^{for hauling} is concerned until I receive remittance of money I gave you my views of sending proceeds of sale of specimens It is now too late to write on the matter if the money is not on the way it need not be sent I exceedingly regret that I did not go north as I intended though in that case I shoudt not have made the very considerable

collection of Mosses &c which I have secured the past winter
I shall go to Austin in a few days and will try to sell drafts
on you or Washington though I have no belief that I will succeed.
There are few men that understand how a gathering of weeds
& grasses can convert them into money and unless a man has
negroes or land his exertions to raise money are looked upon
with suspicion.

Again suppose I sell drafts and in the mean time you
continue means to send me the money you must honor them
or I shall get the character of a villain and I will not
be here to vindicate myself.

I am very glad to receive the letters from Prof. Henry
& the Secy. of War & have no doubt they will be very useful

Dear Naiades came to hand & I was not at all ready to receive
a thing so useless through the P.C. and I was preparing a
pretty considerable scold but your apology for the good
Prof. A. came in time to pacify me. You will not wonder
at the low value I set upon it when I tell you it contains
but one solitary description.

Sullivan writes that he is in communication with me.
Perhaps he means that I am in communication with
him for nothing from him has ever reached me.

You are too late with the flora - shd. have sent
it with the other things. You seem to forget that about sixty
days are required to send a request to Cambridge and
receive an answer.

You need not be particular to have a "full set" for me
if it shd. interfere at all with the sale of sets. My
plan must be to effect as large a sale as possible to enable
me to continue my exploration.

I have a few more shells for ^a paper which I will send
with the mosses &c. in May probably. It seems difficult
to get books on conchology. Wont it be too great a favor to
ask the Prof. to write to me and enclose pencil sketches of
such things as I have sent him for a copy or engraving if any
should be made with the names annexed?

I have been to Austin where I made some efforts to sell

drafts and though I did not succeed I am not without hopes of
doing so. I have no intelligence of the arrival of my paper
and can do nothing till it arrives - can make no contract for
having nor any definite arrangements for my next summer's
business. It is time all the preparations should be completed
I will hold myself in readiness so far as I can do so to
start when any opportunity occurs. The government
train will probably start between the 1st & 10th April.

It will hardly be possible for me to be ready to go
with it. My remaining chance will be to go with
some California Company and a "slim chance" I consider
it. But I will continue looking about me while any hope
remains.

I ~~hope~~ you will give heed to my suggestions respecting
shipments & contained in a previous letter. It is a cause of
great anxiety to me to be looking one day after day for things
sent to me and all the while to be in uncertainty whether ever
I will receive them. Day after day I have remained here hoping
that next mail would bring me some letters, when I was anxious
to be away attending to other business. I left home two weeks
ago reluctantly and in great anxiety and now on my return
find nothing to relieve that anxiety.

But I wont trouble you any more. I am in fine health
Remember me to Mary.
