

San Marcos Oct 15th 1850

My Dear Dr

I returned yesterday from San Antonio prepared to settle down once more at my old profession = pedagogism. You will probably be surprised and vexed at the unfortunate result of all our plans & negotiations. If I did not know the difficulties I would have to meet and the sufferings to be endured in a winter expedition over the woodless plains between the settlements & Del Paso I should be mad enough to cry over my disappointments or as someone says "cussin' mad". But every thing considered I am pretty well reconciled to it & won't be entirely so had I not been treated so ungentlemanly — As soon as I heard of the arrival in our state of the Commissioner I wrote to him at San Antonio and had my papers & trunk carried there two or three months ago. The party remained a long time at Indianola and I heard nothing or but little of them through the papers. I thought when the Commissioner went to San Antonio he would answer my letter. After a while becoming impatient I went to San Antonio but the commission was still at Indianola — however I made arrangements to be informed of its arrival in San Antonio and a few days ago I received intelligence that the party was in San Antonio and would start on this day. I went there on the 12th inst but the Commissioner had started two days before on a forced march. He had however been very particular to give me no intelligence of his movements. His brother whom I saw & conversed with apologize for the neglect of me by his the Commissioner thus — "that his letter to Prof. Henry which I showed him was written previous to his appointment as Commissioner!!! It won't seem that he had some favorite of his own to appoint to a fat office - Dr. Thurber (I saw a volunteer note from him to Mr. Gidheimes promising to call to see him — the promise however unfulfilled) So — a fig for the promises of

Washington Officials) A horrid spot is however sometimes seen in the vast desert of human selfishness Such on one I found in the pleasant smile of Maj. Bullock and his kind promise to give me transportation to El Paso He has been long enough in the south (if not native) to have imbibed that noble & disinterested generosity of which so eminently distinguished southern ^{the} Gentlemen or more probably was a gentleman originally & by nature I am disposed to believe that but little love for Texas or any of her citizens can be found at Washington during the recess of Congress ~~much less~~ any when north of that (of course I make exceptions) I received a very kind letter from Dr. Torrey a short time ago & I shall ever remember your and other kindness who have assisted me You may have the benefit of Dr. Thoburn's collections but I question whether he will climb hills and wade ditches and pierce thickets as I would do If he don't ^{by Bigelow?} don a buckskin dress he will endanger his ~~broadcloth~~ One of the attacks of the expedition wanted to buy paper and if I had been a couple of days earlier I wrote & have sold him mine — and the second time sacrificed my botanizing apparatus for ready money & to save the expense of transportation I paid \$130 charges at Fort Yavaca some three or four more for hauling here \$26 more for hauling to San Antonio — the same to be paid for hauling back & when I shall have it carried again to San Antonio next Spring (when I hope to get off) you see it will have cost me not much less than the prime cost I paid more than twice as much as I ought to have paid for carrying my collection to Port Yavaca a year ago (\$60) You may not see the necessity of all these goings & returnings but I hope you will give me the credit of acting wisely according to my ability You have never been in Texas and can not know all the circumstances by which my actions are governed and were I to detail them it would but serve to consume your time to read them

You may think it strange that I need ready money when you sent me so much by Mr. Bantle Whether he had it or not he fails to let me know it His

whole conduct towards me was a pure of "masterly forgetfulness" *

I have a little money but the \$130 paid me by Dr. Baker is nearly gone and would have been entirely spent had I not collected some small sum due me I shall probably make \$135 the coming winter So I am not at all troubled at present only I have a natural Yarba? curiosity to know what has become of the \$378.11

Some philosopher reviewing a day spent without doing good said he "has lost a day" Methinks he has less philosophy than myself who can look back upon the last season and say almost with truth "I have lost a summer" I give the word "philosophy" a wide latitude of meaning My paper arrived late in the season I sent it away early soon after receiving it or I would have been very glad to have saved a set of plants for myself and for exchange but that I had no safe place to leave them when I started west I am expression in my letters "you had better not" it was not well thought of to send this "Yucca bundle" dissuaded me from sending them to you I saw Lindheimer and had some pleasure and talk with him He seems to be poor — richer however than I am — he has a wife & two children I long to get another letter from you I wrote you a long letter some time ago directing it to Cambridge You did not tell me where you would return but I hope and ~~trust~~ you won't be as home by the time it would reach there

I sent my cryptogamia to Dr. Torrey and they have been received also I left a small package with Lindheimer to be sent on with his I hope you will look after these and if they can be turned to any account see that I receive in some way the benefit of them I would not be this particular had not my earnings been so small and my expenses ^{losses} of time so great You can not but notice that in this & my former ^{letter} I have written with some despondency & bitterness of failing though I do

not feel ^{sensibly} the approach of age I can not but ^{know} ~~feel~~ that I am growing old and what is worse an old bachelor The vexatious suspense in which I have been kept the two years past has operated powerfuly to prevent me from putting off old-bachelorism or making some attempts therat. Perhaps ^{also} I put too high an estimate on my labors and am disposed to think some ~~act~~^{done} to others — not appreciate at their true value For instance I can not but be vexed when I think of Prof. Agassiz sending me so useless a thing as that catalogue of shells — I packed it full of plants & sent it off again
