

Netherlands Nov 11th 1852

Dear Dr

I arrived here early this morning having left New York yesterday at 4 o'clock P.M.

When I went down I passed a letter from Washington sent to Dr Torrey & forwarded by him being from Prof. Baird I was impatient to know its contents, made my stay somewhat shorter than I otherwise would. However I made a pretty good distribution of all the families above Endogens and should have completed the job if Mr Carey had been able to assist me as he intended but after one day's work other business called him away & I had to do all the rest alone. I spent a very pleasant week in the Dr's family.

Prof. Baird assures me there is no chance for money until Congates meets His last two letters (of 21st & 22nd) both referred to the Behring's Straits Expedition and both express anxiety for an answer. The answer was promptly given and now I am equally anxious to know the result of my acceptance. My failure to get any money from Washington will be a good excuse for delay to return to the Boundary and yet I don't want to be here idle however pleasant it might otherwise be to stay with my family.

I found among Dr Bigelow's plants some of these queer plants which I took for *Actinella seaposa* and he has I think three or four forms of it I did not

have time to look over the plants especially the Coppermine collection so thoroughly as I wished for such as are not among mine. However we ~~separated~~^(youth 2) a few among them the little Hedysarum which we used to quarrel so much about. Dr. Torrey's collections contain several queer things but they are almost all single and scrappy at that.

When will some of the Pl. Wright No. 2 be ready for distribution? Do you hear anything from Engelmann?

The plants I brought home with me are doing pretty well and the Epiphyllum has now two beautiful blossoms.

I am through forgetfulness with Dr. Torrey's copy of Salm Dyck. You can get it however when he writes you at Thanksgiving.

I regretted the Dr. Wm's expenses on the plants from New Orleans & in doing it made a blunder for which I was "rowed up Salt river" all the time I stayed after it.

Let me hear soon how you get on and oblige
