

Brooklyn April 21st 1853

My Dear Dr

Your last two letters have remained
I believe till now unanswered. The draft on Boston is
cashed and the article on Nyctigen is laid away for
future use. I have been reading Payer on the
Crypsid. Time however hangs rather heavily.

Can't you help me by advice about some books
to fill up the gap between the end of De Candolle &
the end of Gray? I can get at Baillier's a little book
on the Coniferous & deciduous I think but I have nothing
on the Lemnaceae or Cyperaceae nor on the Mosses
or Ferns or Orchids. I shall have to depend on Dr
Gossyp for a copy of Lindley (he borrowing Dr Parry's)
till you can be imported for him.

* Had I better have Legrand's Algae I have Haworth's
British marine Algae (Manual) Will it pay to purchase
Legrand myself? What few books I get now will be
at my own expense.

Is the first book nearly finished and how soon
will you have any of the Expl. Exp. printed. That
would be of great use to me.

If I had known how slow we would be in starting
and how disproportionate my requisition ^{would be} to Stimpson's
I would have had more books ordered from Europe but
it is now too late. Rumm says will be off the last of the
week or first of next. So make it be and the quicker the

better I want to get into a warmer regions and particularly
when there will be something to do

I will find out before we finally sail how letters
must be sent and let you know and then you can give
direction, how Silliman may be seen whom I will be
glad & thankful to receive. We will stop awhile at Nor-
folk or when I shall be glad to hear from you I may have
a chance to botanize a little then by way of keeping my
hand in at least I can get a few mosses & lichens if
the Palms have not come into flower.

Dr Torrey has moved into his new house Parry is helping
him put his alund and materials in order Bigelow was
here a few days since and began a sort of good natured quarrel
with me because you did not give him credit for every
thing he and I jointly found. I told him he ought to be very
thankful that he got ~~any~~ credit at all
