Monte Verde May 11

Dear Dr.

At last I have a letter  
from home of date Apr. 5th  
What has become of previous  
one - well postmaster, know  
I suppose.

As I am sending back an  
answer (I just this minute killed  
a flea) I can slip in a line  
for you. The rainy season has  
set in & the weather is catching  
I have to be on the lookout for  
patches of sunshine. The other  
day I started out when it was  
clear (it had been showering) but  
had not got half a mile away  
when it commenced raining ~~again~~  
& I had to return. Yesterday I  
made a pretty successful half-day's  
work in the wood. ~~Yesterday~~ I

got a good supply of a *Blésia*<sup>polygamia</sup> tree of which I brought home a few imperfect specimens (stam.) before it had <sup>small</sup> ovules. leaves, with a sharp rigid point. It won't go into any of the *Nicotiana*, genera. This time I have good specimens (flowering) I'll look out for fruit afterwards I got also specimen of a small tree with raceme ~~of~~<sup>instead</sup> <sup>fully</sup> flowered & I think I got it before it bore any fruit. <sup>between</sup> Cal. 5-fol. intricate leaflets unequal & on non-ornamented, deeply 5-parted Stamen 10. Anthers opening by pores at the tip. Ovary 5-celled. 1 ovule in the apex of each cell. Style simple Anthers in the bus with the apex turned downward & the lower end pointed. It won't go into any *Breia* genus than I know of.

I find an *Azara* or something of the kind common here - a short

tree now in full flower - no leaves yet. I have marked several for fruit & leaves.

I picked up flowers of another <sup>little</sup> verbenaceous tree. Tomorrow I mean to go & cut it or climb for the foliage & good specimen.

When Mrs Gray comes over I wish you would be so kind as to send me for Mr. Z some treatise on bee culture. If you can get a French one it will be well - but English will do. Also if you will send me a few shoe makers awls - straight & crooked - and some copper shoe-nails. There is a sort of cobbler here but he has no tools or very poor ones. The weeks & men are very hard on ones understanding Nails long enough to go through a
