July 10th 1860

Dear Dr.

At last those books have come

The Maria has come for bus the paper hasn't. There is some comfort in that for it may give Humber a chance to exchange it for some of the right one. If it had come however I could have it cut back if it comes when I am away inland and the inches too long I am afraid I shall say caramba mal-dita & perhaps damn it. I wouldn't want to punish him worse than to send him to the top of La Guineu when she has her night-caps on with the paper sticking out an inch at each end of his portfolio. The reason why the paper didn't come - it was sent down late on a rainy night & the coast wouldn't receive it.

I came to town today & tomorrow night I go to Guanabacoa thence to Monte Redondo & back by Atabille ~~to~~ for my plants to pack up & send you by Capt White with whom I came out & who will sail in ten days more or less probably more. I go there partly to finish the lun job since gets quite well & to get some introductory letters which I left there partly too to see the good friend. At last I got a good lot of a fern I had not before met with at this time & a bus ent for Engelmann. I have thin whole teams & some odd pieces & have come (I think) to the end of the lun & now

at N. Sophie which I shall collect together  
for my trip into the country. When that is used up  
I shall have to return here or send it & in so doing  
will run the risk of getting beaten two inches  
for being & no damage to cut it but with a knife  
"Pogoniu Cubensis form in Cuba by Peppings  
in his in Wright's collection" — You have not  
got the plant out of *Buxus cubana*. It's funny!  
If any one were to see these two remarks I恐怕  
will be what they say without knowing of me  
they may easily take me for some boorish person  
who picks up here & there a plant & he could not  
get out of so going. I write you of a flying excursion  
I had through Most Lata, Mont. Peñon &c  
with Mr. L. I intended to return then, but have  
not had time. I may doze off & when I shall  
look out for *Buxus Cubana*. If I should be lucky  
enough to come across *Pogoniu Cubensis* (which  
I hope) I shall get that too. But if you calculate  
me to make "clean work" of it you shall reward my  
powers I think!!

Don't send me ordinary knives — I can get  
easily here & you find back in the U.S.  
and so on.

My knee is doing well — give me my plain-heal.  
I am by what the Doctor calls "the first intention" —  
now only a little sore & stiff. However I think I  
should best to put it to active use after a few  
days yet.

Don't bother yourself about papers. As to Brooks,  
the head of the firm, he has always treated me crustily  
I would gladly think otherwise but I can't. Some of  
the gentlemen of the firm <sup>have</sup> been kind but I can't

overrate the kindness of those at Santa Catalina de  
Guantanamo. I got a paper at a paper now & then  
& after I go to the interior I shant hardly do  
much better if you send them by the ship-load  
I hope if any letter arrives in time my com-  
micks about the length of the paper won't be taken  
as a joke. If I have to trim with a butcher  
knife 16 reams of paper I shall consider it no  
joke I tell you.

I send a paper of mine in which Galliano  
may find diatoms if he can.

If it were not for the paper I should not  
send off this till my return from Yatera —  
as I wrote not very long ago

The fleas are giving me fits & I must  
turn out of my present robbing & into bed tho'  
it's not late.
