

Mount Venda April 11/8/81

My Dear Dr

I got home today just in time to escape a rain of the heaviest kind and not of short duration. Yesterday I got a good wetting. I have been absent about forty days. I have found quite a number of novelties & some others that have a newish look. The books have come & now I can have the comfort of studying some. If I had had them at first I would now know a little of genera & species instead of knowing only families & that very imperfectly. Today I found again my Ciccia scandens male & female and not content with specimens alone I got a piece of the stem for I intend to establish it as a true sp. It is a genuine climber exactly like Beltis aculeata or Pisonia aculeata but without their spines. The stam. fl. are much smaller than those of B. undulata var. viscosa (as well as I remember) and are yellowish green while those of the latter are white. The habit or manner of growth ought also to be of some importance. If this proves to be a true sp. the other two must be raised to the rank of species for the southern sp. flowers

at a height of 4°-18° & is common while the tree-form 6-10' diam & 40-50' high I have seen only twice so well as I can recollect. So if the original b. Ant. is ~~the~~<sup>fasciculata</sup> original sp. as is most probable the other will be b. arborea. If the form of the leaves agrees, no specific char. the color is different to that of the fr. particularly so.

A Slave has just landed 600+ bales nearly 15 of them are here. There is a bone for your newness to know. If you want to stop the slave trade just keep a few small steamers around this island. If England manifests half the energy displayed in the Napoleonic war & half the disregard of international law exhibited in the bombardment of Copenhagen or the attack on Com. Porter in a neutral port she could entirely stop the slave trade in a year. She need not fear the threats of the poor ~~de~~ United States now. She keeps up a great naval establishment on the coast of Africa to little purpose except to watch over the interests of her colonies there. Let her quit gawking at the U.S. for not doing the same thing. If that naval force properly managed were on the coast of Cuba there would be no more slave trade.

14th Mr. J. spoke today of sending his captives arrived to Baracoa for a load of coco-nuts to plant. He knows I have been anxious to go by land if I could & I suspect he has this excursion in mind as much for my sake as for his own. But he is now getting his crops to market & we can not set out for some time yet & it is perhaps just as well as to go now.

You wrote me once that ~~you~~ had no doubt I had sent Bregas to Cuba. I don't find it. Pl. Wright & I begin to suspect that for some cause or another

a good many of my plants are not included I expect as am sure that I got it in my late excursion near Dagua. I write you that I found a second sp. of Portlandia. It has a short angled capsule & I propose to name it *P. grisebachia* — I believe that is the correct orthography — is not you can settle it as I haven't a great library in my *cubera*. I enclose some bits of *Cicca scandens* for epineback. You have plenty of *b. Antillana* var *glaucescens* (b. scandens) worth pretty well given fr. — var *viridis* you have in abundance fl. & fr. — and var *pedicellata* you have with full grown fr. but no fl. so far as I know. The seed would probably furnish specific characters. Your last — Feby 23 — is getting to be rather ancient.

Kind regards to Mrs. L. & my friend down the street if you happen to meet them.
